4. CRTPA DISCUSSION

A. Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 – FY 2021 Transportation Alternatives (TA) Priority Project List (PPL)

The TA PPL identifies projects that expand travel choices including on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other non-motorized forms of transportation, recreational trail programs, safe routes to school projects. Projects on the list are actively solicited by the CRTPA every two (2) years.

Citizen Comment:

Stacy Slavichak, 1805 Fernando Drive, Tallahassee, supports Glenview Drive sidewalk project. Stated Glenview Drive is a high traffic street and provided petition from neighbors supporting the project.

Board Action: Commissioner Merritt made a motion to accept the Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 – FY 2021 Transportation Alternatives (TA) Priority Project List (PPL). Commissioner Miller seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously passed.

B. Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan (RMP)/Draft Cost Feasible Plan (CFP)

The RMP Draft Cost Feasible plan has been developed through the matching of anticipated revenue with the eligible transportation projects that have been previously been scored using the approved prioritization process.

Citizen Comment:

Helena Safron, 1313 North Bronough Street, Tallahassee, stated she is a cyclist and has been hit by a car while cycling. She stated she has back pain from her injury. She expressed the need for bike lanes and extended shoulders along all roadways. She stated she has considered moving to a different community that has better infrastructure for bicyclist.

Joseph Barnett, 3224 Horseshoe Trail, Tallahassee, stated he bikes to work and everywhere. He expressed concerns of the importance of bike lanes for cyclists. He stated bike lanes are important and discussed the health benefits of cycling.

Will Hanley, 1911 Waholow Court, Tallahassee, stated he is a supporter of bike lanes, sidewalks and multiuse trails. He stated bicycling is not just an alternate method of transportation for him and his family and without them they are on an unsafe roadway. He is opposed to removing any bike lanes from the plan.

Hans Van Tol, 1503 Old Ford Drive, Tallahassee, stated he was shocked when he reviewed this agenda item. He stated one of the main outcomes of the public participation of the Regional Mobility Plan was the importance of safety and complete streets. He stated bike lanes and sidewalks have been stricken by the RMP. He disagreed with the cost estimates for sidewalks and bike lanes. He discussed the cost of the roadway projects that would be receiving funding, noting the cost were much higher than bike lanes in various areas in the community.

Jeff Hunter, 219 Pine Lane, Tallahassee, stated he was the former Bike Coordinator. He stated during the 2020 Long Range Plan. He stated, 15 years later, there are many uncompleted projects. He stated there are many projects that have not been completed. He discussed the difficulty of traveling along many roadways, specifically, Gaines Street.

Justin Pogge, 1200 Stearn Street, Tallahassee, stated he is a business owner and he and his employees bike to work and many customers ride to his restaurant. He stated more people would like to bike, but feel unsafe. He expressed the need for bike lanes along major road ways.

Board Action: Commissioner Merritt made a motion to accept the Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan and Draft Cost Feasible Plan. Commissioner Madison seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

DRAFT FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2016 – FY 2020 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

REQUESTED BY: Staff

Type of Item: Consent

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

Consistent with state and federal requirements, the DRAFT Fiscal Year (FY) 2016– FY 2020 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) has been developed (Attachment 1) for Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) transmittal to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) for review.

CRTPA COMMITTEE ACTIONS

The CRTPA's two (2) committees (Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee) were scheduled to meet on May 12, 2015. Due to the deadline associated with development and distribution of the CRTPA agenda, any committee recommendations for this and other agenda items will be provided under separate cover prior to the meeting.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Approve transmittal of the Draft FY 2016 – FY 2020 TIP to the Florida Department of Transportation for review.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

The CRTPA Transportation Improvement Program identifies regional transportation projects (roadway, bicycle and pedestrian, transportation systems management, transportation enhancement, public transportation, aviation, resurfacing and bridge projects) that have received funding in the Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) Five-Year Work Program. The TIP is developed in accordance with 23 U.S.C. 134(h), 23 CFR 450 and Chapter 339.175(7), F.S., and is one of the annual requirements of the metropolitan transportation planning process for the CRTPA.

The purpose of the TIP is to inform the public and governmental agencies of transportation projects (planning through construction) that have received funding during the next five-year period (FY 2016 – FY 2020) within our region (Gadsden, Jefferson, Leon and Wakulla counties).

Projects contained within the DRAFT FY 2016 – FY 2020 TIP reflect those projects that were presented to the CRTPA Board on January 13, 2014 by the FDOT District 3 during their presentation of the FDOT Draft FY 2015– FY 2019 Five-Year Work Program. Since the CRTPA Board approved the Draft Cost Feasible Plan on April 20, 2015, the Project Team held public meetings and developed the Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan. These efforts are described below:

Public Meetings

The Project Team held meetings in all four counties that constitute the CRTPA region. The first series of meetings were held on April 23, 2015 in Gadsden and Wakulla counties followed by meetings in Jefferson and Leon counties on April 27, 2015.

The public comments regarding the Draft Cost Feasible Plan are shown as Attachment 1.

Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan

The Draft Cost Feasible Plan that was presented at the April 20, 2015 CRTPA meeting included the projects that the Project Team feels can be moved forward successfully into the next five years (when the plan is updated again) with both completed efforts and initiating other efforts. The roadway plan and bike/pedestrian plan both demonstrate the Project Team's "finish what you started, make it realistic and implementable" approach.

There are a few changes to the Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan format that are discussed below.

Bike and Pedestrian

Tier 1 Projects

Currently, no bike and pedestrian project has funding in Tier 1 (2016-2020) that is seeking funding in Tier 2 or 3 with the exception of the Glenview Drive (Meridian Road to Thomasville Road) sidewalk. This project was approved as the top priority for the Transportation Alternative (TA) Program at the April 20, 2015 CRTPA Board meeting. If the project is successful in being funded with TA funds then appropriate action will be taken to "modify" the Cost Feasible Plan.

There are two projects that have PD&E Studies underway or completed that are seeking funding in Tier 2 and beyond and those are:

- 1. Florida Arts Trail North Corry Street to Florida-Georgia Highway (Design)
- 2. North Trout Pond Trail Springhill Road to Downtown Tallahassee/ St. Marks Trail (Design)

Early Phase and Late Phase

There are two projects that are divided into Early and Late Phases based on the cost of the project and they are:

- 1. Florida Arts Trail (North Corry Street to Florida-Georgia Highway)
- 2. North Trout Pond Trail (Springhill Road to Downtown Tallahassee/St. Marks Trail)

Tiers 2, 3, and 4 and the "Vision" projects

Similar to the roadway projects, all other projects not funded from the Needs Plan are on the second page of the Bike and Pedestrian Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan, known as the bike and pedestrian "Vision Plan".

The Draft Final Bike and Pedestrian Cost Feasible Plan is shown as **Attachment 2** and the Bike and Pedestrian Vision Plan is shown as **Attachment 3**.

Roadway

Tier 1 Projects

The Project Team added Tier 1 funding into the Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan to demonstrate how these efforts will be completed. Just to clarify, these are not the only projects in Tier 1, just the projects that have incomplete funding. There are seven projects that have funding in Tier 1, including:

- 1. Woodville Highway Capital Circle, Southeast to Paul Russell Road (Right-of-way)
- 2. Capital Circle, Southwest Springhill Road to Orange Avenue (Right-of-way)
- 3. Capital Circle, Southwest Springhill Road to Crawfordville Road (Right-of-way)
 Note: The funds shown in Tier 1 (Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Work
 Program \$38,804,000) are Blueprint 2000 funds or LF (Local Funds) as noted by the FDOT.
 No agreement has been reached about the utilization of these funds and therefore the
 project as shown in **Attachment 4** uses CRTPA funds to complete the project. This effort
 will have better definition as the FDOT, CRTPA and Blueprint 2000 coordinate funding
 efforts in the near future.
- 4. Crawfordville Road US 98 to Lost Creek Bridge (Design)
- 5. Crawfordville Road Lost Creek Bridge to East Ivan Road (Design)
- 6. Quincy Bypass South Pat Thomas Parkway to Jefferson Street (PD&E)
- 7. Quincy Bypass North Bainbridge Highway to Havana Highway (PD&E)

Not all of the projects are estimated to be completed in Tier 2 (2021-2025), some will carry through to Tiers 3 (2026-2030) and 4 (2031-2040). The main point to showing the flow of these projects is to maximize the opportunities available for funding partnerships without having to lockdown a specific time period since there are so many "unknowns" with these efforts considering the limited projected revenues.

Early Phase and Late Phase

There are some refinements that were discussed at the April 20, 2015 CRTPA Board meeting that divided the projects into two phases: Early Phase and Late Phase. The Early Phase constitutes 25% of the project COST and includes efforts such as the initial Project Development and Environment Study (PD&E) and Design Phase for projects. The Late Phase includes the Right-of-Way and Construction Phases for the projects and is 75% of the estimated project cost.

Tiers 2, 3, and 4 and the "Vision" projects

The last change that occurred in presenting the Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan projects is the separation of the Tier 2, 3, and 4 projects from the "Vision" projects. Vision projects are Needs Plan projects for which no funding has been identified to complete within the year 2040 timeframe.

Two separate sheets were created to present the "tiered" projects and "Vision" projects. The main reason for this was to focus on the projects utilizing the revenues from all sources.

The Draft Final Roadway Cost Feasible Plan is shown as **Attachment 4**, and the Roadway Vision Plan is shown as **Attachment 5**.

Transit

The Project Team continues to work with StarMetro in identifying transit projects in incorporate into the Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan and will be presented at a future CRTPA meeting for finalization. The Draft Transit projects are shown as

The Draft Transit Plan is shown as Attachment 6.

Project Schedule

There is one adjustment to the schedule regarding the Public Hearing. The schedule originally showed a May 12, 2015 date for an ad placement, a May 22, 2015 public meeting for the Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan, June 12, 2015 ad for the Final Cost Feasible Plan, and a June 22, 2015 Public Hearing (all shown in green). These dates were predicated on the need to have a Public Hearing for the Adoption of the Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan (RMP). However, after discussing with the Federal Highway Administration, the June 29, 2015 CRTPA Board meeting is to approve the Cost Feasible Plan (one component of the Connections 2040 RMP), not adopt the entire document. Therefore, there is no need for the May 12, 2015 ad deadline, the May 22, 2015 Draft Cost Feasible Plan meeting, the June 12, 2015 ad for the Cost Feasible Plan, or the June 22, 2015 Public Hearing. These meetings will be schedule for October of this year. The schedule shown below reflects the current schedule for approving the Final Cost Feasible Plan, and will be augmented to reflect the need to have a Public Hearing and Plan Adoption in November.

o I am concerned that the Draft Cost Feasible Plan is inconsistent with the adopted RMP Goals and the public input provided through the workshops (as detailed in workshop summaries) in that modes of transportation do not appear to be coordinated and integrated. There does not seem to be any coordination of transit, aviation, freight, bicycle, or pedestrian projects with the roadway projects. They seem to be isolated on separate lists and not considered as a complete multi-modal system. Many transportation modes are not presented in the Draft Cost Feasible Plan at all. While I agree that the projects should be on separate lists in the RMP, there should be some indication that the projects are coordinated with the goal of creating an interconnected, multi-modal transportation system that promotes a variety of travel choices and enhances the integration between travel modes. Whether intended or not, the project team has given the impression to many in the public that the needs of bicyclists and pedestrians are being disregarded and their input is not valued or being considered.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

Background

The Capital City to the Sea Trails Master Plan was adopted by the CRTPA in March of 2014. The top ranked project from the Master Plan was the US 98 Trail, now known as the Coastal Trail, which was funded through remaining Master Plan funds. The Coastal Trail Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study began in June of 2014 with project limits beginning at CR 59 (the entrance road to the St. Marks Wildlife Refuge) to the east to Surf Road to the west, shown as **Attachment 1**.

Over the course of the last 10 months the Project Team has worked with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Florida Department of State, (FDOS), and Wakulla County to ensure that the PD&E study meets all the requirements necessary to move this project forward to the Design Phase.

Categorical Exclusion

A Categorical Exclusion (CE) is a project or a category of actions which do not individually or cumulatively have a significant environmental impact, and are excluded from the requirement to prepare an Environmental Assessment (EA) or an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). However, this does not mean that an environmental analysis isn't required.

The FDOT has a prescribed method for determining a Class of Action (COA) for projects with bike and pedestrian facilities falling under a Type I Categorical Exclusion. These types of projects allow the FDOT to be the lead agency for the project thus shortening the time for review and approval of the project.

Design and Construction Phase

Since the section from Woodville Highway to US 319 does not require right-of-way, and connects to the St. Marks Trail, the Project Team recommended that this section would be the first to fund for design and construction. CRTPA staff, working with FDOT, was able to fund the Design Phase and Construction Phase of the project. However, the funding is not currently available to build Segment 2 under a single contract so Segment 2 was further divided into four smaller segments to complete. These segments include the following with the year of construction:

- 1. Boykin Road to St. Francis Street, Construction 2016/2017
- 2. St. Francis Street to Horttor Greene Road, Construction 2017/2018
- 3. Horttor Greene Road to Davisville Way, Construction 2018/2019
- 4. Davisville Way to Woodville Highway, Construction 2019/2020

These are the projects segments that are currently shown in the FDOT Draft 2016 – 2020 Work Program shown as **Attachment 2**.

State Infrastructure Bank Loan

One of the efforts that CRTPA staff and the Project Team are pursuing, as was presented to the CRTPA Board at the April 20, 2015 CRTPA meeting, is the use of a State Infrastructure Bank (SIB) loan to aggregate the above individual segments (four individual projects) into a single project. This would

reduce the collective project costs and complete the project under one contract instead of four. CRTPA staff will keep Board members up to date as this effort progresses.

NEXT STEPS

Public Meeting

After the CRTPA Board approves the Coastal Trail PD&E Study, the Project Team will hold a public meeting to receive comments on the project.

ELECTION OF MPOAC REPRESENTATIVE

Type of Item: Discussion

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

As provided for in Florida State Statute and CRTPA By-Laws, a representative and alternate to the Florida Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council (MPOAC) are elected by the CRTPA Board. The current MPOAC representative, Ms. Delores Madison of Midway, is no longer eligible to serve as the representative from CRTPA. A new MPOAC representative is required to serve the remainder of her term.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Appoint the Alternate (Commissioner Nick Maddox) as the new MPOAC representative to complete the current term and elect a new alternate.

OR

Option 2: Elect an MPOAC Representative.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

Florida Statute 339.175 requires that each Florida MPO elect one of its members to serve on the Florida Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council Governing Board. Florida Statutes also require each MPO to elect one of its members as an alternate member to serve in the absence of its appointee. This requirement is also identified in Section IV C of the adopted CRTPA By-laws as revised January 12, 2015.

The current CRTPA representative is Ms. Madison who was elected in November 2013 to serve a three year term from January 2014 through 2016. Ms. Madison is no longer be eligible serve on the CRTPA Board and a new MPOAC representative is required to serve out her term.

The CRTPA's MPOAC alternate, serving until the end of 2016, is Commissioner Nick Maddox.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Appoint the Alternate (Commissioner Nick Maddox) as the new MPOAC representative to complete the current term and elect a new alternate.

OR

Option 2: Elect an MPOAC Representative.

Option 3: Provide other direction.

TRANSITION PLAN FOR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

REQUESTED BY: CRTPA Chair Type of Item: Discussion/Approval

STATEMENT OF **I**SSUE

The current CRTPA Executive Director will be leaving CRTPA at the end of the current year. In order to find a replacement, a method and timeline is needed to hire a new executive director. A transition plan provides the necessary steps and timeline to have a smooth change in leadership.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Approve the proposed transition plan for the CRTPA Executive Director

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

When the current CRTPA Executive Director was hired in 2007, the CRTPA was under a different management structure. There was a Management Oversight Committee consisting of the County Administrators of Leon, Gadsden and Wakulla counties and the City Manager for the City of Tallahassee. The management structure provided for the Executive Director to report to the Leon County Administrator and the City Manager for the City of Tallahassee. Since that time, several organizational changes have occurred.

The Florida State Legislature changed the state statute regarding the establishment and structure of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) in the state of Florida. The most significant change was to change the status of a MPO. MPOs were set up as independent bodies of the state and that the executive directors of MPOs would report to their respective boards and not be affiliated with county or city administrations. The other significant change was the change in the CRTPA's planning boundaries. The CRTPA Board voted in 2009 to expand the planning boundaries to include all of four counties of Jefferson, Gadsden, Leon and Wakulla. This expansion was approved in 2011 by the Governor of Florida. Since that time, a new interlocal agreement and revised by-laws for CRTPA have been executed reflecting these changes. In addition, a staff services agreement with the City of Tallahassee has been executed.

Since the responsibility for the hiring a new executive director now rests with the CRTPA Board, a transition plan provides the guidance needed to have a smooth change in leadership (included as **Attachment 1**).

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Approve the proposed transition plan for the CRTPA executive director (Recommended)

Option 2: Provide other direction.

Review Committee Advertise Application Submissions Shortlist Finalists Finalist Interviews & Selection Hire

Review Committee

Establish a CRTPA Executive Committee (current CRTPA Chair, Vice Chair, Past Chair, Board Member from the City of Tallahassee and Gadsden County) to review job specification/description, salary, benefits, development of employment contract, and management structure. Consider a first committee meeting to review job description and salary the week of June 15th. Second committee meeting to consider benefit package, employment contract and management structure in August 2015.

Advertise (July)

In the past, advertisement for the Executive Director position has been through the City of Tallahassee Human Resources Department. It is recommended that this method be utilized since it is one of the services that is provided to CRTPA through its Staff Services Agreement with the City.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) annually provides more than \$37 billion of Federal funding to States to construct and improve highways and bridges. To ensure States appropriately budget and plan for the use of Federal funds on transportation projects, Congress requires them to submit, and FHWA to approve, State Transportation Improvement Programs (STIP). States develop STIPs in coordination with metropolitan planning organizations (MPO) and non-metropolitan local officials and include projects planned for implementation over a 4-year period. FHWA also reviews the STIPs to determine project eligibility for Federal funds, State compliance with Federal requirements, and fiscal constraint—meaning the STIPs must demonstrate that program funding is reasonably available.

The objective of this self-initiated audit is to assess FHWA policies, procedures, and guidance for ensuring that STIPs receive comprehensive, consistent reviews and meet Federal requirements, including coordination with the Federal Transit Administration. STATEMENT OF ISSUE

This item provides information to the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) on the activities of the Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee (CMAC), the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), and the Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Boards (TDCBs) for Leon, Wakulla, Jefferson, and Gadsden counties.

CRTPA SUBCOMMITTEE ACTIONS

TAC and CMAC: The CMAC and TAC met on Tuesday, May 12, 2015 and had unanimous approval of the following items:

- Minutes of the April 14, 2015 Committee Meetings
- Draft Fiscal Year 2016-2020 Transportation Improvement Program
- Capital City to the Sea Trail Coastal Trail

The following items were approved by both the TAC and the CMAC, however, only the TAC had unanimous approval.

Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan – Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan

TAC Action: Unanimous approval of the Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan.

Members discussed a desire to have the spreadsheets amended to improve traceability across Tiers of project costs by funding entity (example, federal dollars, Blueprint). Additionally, they requested that the spreadsheets be amended to reflect total incoming revenues and outgoing expenditures by Tier and by funding entity to further increase the traceability of projected project programming. CRTPA staff has incorporated these clarification edits.

<u>CMAC Action:</u> The CMAC approved the Draft Final Cost Feasible Plan with a vote of 6 in favor and 1 against. The vote against approval stated a belief that the projects included in the Draft Cost Feasible Plan furthered the continuation of projects of the past rather than furthering the vision of the community today.
