A. Fiscal Year (FY) 2016 - FY 2020 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment

The CRTPA FY 2016 – FY 2020 TIP is proposed to be amended to reflect the following:

 City of Tallahassee/StarMetro Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Facility (Project #4234452): Add project to reflect funding for the construction of CNG facility (Leon County) (Total funding: \$4 million in FY 2016).

Board Action: Commissioner Merritt made a motion to accept the Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-FY 2020 TIP Amendment, as presented by staff. Commissioner Bowen seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

5. CRTPA ACTION

A. Executive Director Selection Update

This agenda item will provide an update on the status of the Executive Director position.

Commissioner Barfield updated the board on the Executive Director Selection Process, outlined the negotiation process. She outlined the applicant requested salary, severance and 10 hour days. The board Commissioner Lindley did not think the 4-day work week was feasible for a new employee. Commissioner Bowen discussed having a 'date certain' for the 4-day work weeks to end and discussed comparing other MPO Director's schedules. Commissioner Dozier stated this position using a 4-day work week, could be challenging. She stated this position should be allowed some flexibility in the beginning, but not for the long-term.

Board Action: Commissioner Merritt made a motion to complete further discussions the applicant, informing him of the board decision for a 5-day workweek, salary and severance. Commissioner Lindley seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

B. CRTPA Office Location

This agenda item seeks Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) Board approval of resolution to authorize the Interim Executive Director to enter into a lease agreement for office space located at 1030 East Lafayette Street, Tallahassee, Florida.

Board Action: Informational Item, therefore, no action was taken.

C. CRTPA 2016 Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) Review Criteria

This agenda item seeks approval of an update to the CRTPA's TAP adopted review criteria as recently recommended by the CRTPA's Transportation Alternatives (TA) Subcommittee.

Board Action: Commissioner Lindley made a motion to accept the CRTPA 2016 Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) Review Criteria. Commissioner Desloge seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

D. Florida Arts Trail - Gadsden County Board of County Commissioners Report

This item provides the materials that were presented to the Gadsden County Board of County Commissioners (Gadsden County BOCC) on March 1, 2016 regarding the Florida Arts Trail. This includes the actions that are recommended by the Gadsden County BOCC to the CRTPA for inclusion into the Florida Arts Trail Project Development and Environment Study.

Commissioner Viegbesie stated at the September 24 meeting the item was before the board. Gadsden County requested time to review the project. He noted a letter was sent to every homeowner along the proposed trail. Property owners had the opportunity to express concerns at the community workshop. The workshop recommendations were forwarded to FDOT and CRTPA. Commissioner Desloge and Merritt, stated the decision should be made by Gadsden County, as they will have the project within their area of the region.

Board Action: Informational Item, therefore, no action was taken.

E. Florida Arts Trail – Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study

At the March 1, 2016 Gadsden County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) meeting, Commissioners approved a motion to incorporate the SR 12 Florida Arts Trail Task Force recommendations into the Florida Arts Trail Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study. Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) staff has reviewed these recommendations and will discuss these options with the CRTPA Board.

Diana M. Thurman, 361 King Street, Quincy, FL, stated the original project discussed and approved by Gadsden County Board of County Commissioners was not the same as the project as presented with the PD&E Study. Further noting, the original concept included a 4-foot path attached to the side of the current roadway and designated for bike usage. She opposed the project.

Margie Sims, 612 Havana Highway, Quincy, FL 32352, stated the public notice for the public meetings. She discussed the current conditions and stated the proposed project. She noted, the City of Quincy does not support the project.

Kim Doxey, 2618 Mayfair Road, Tallahassee, stated he believed this project could be refocused to expand the trails network, including the Capital City to the Sea Trail system. He stated recently, there was a Havana Hills Classic Bike Ride in the area with over 40 participants. Further noted, the Florida Arts Trail, there should be a part of a larger set of trails used to connect to Tallahassee and the St. Marks Trail on to Apalachicola, FL. This project with the connections completed, could be a mecca for cycling tourists looking for scenic roadways to ride.

Freida Bass Prieto, 329 E. King Street, Quincy, FL, addressed the public involvement for this project. She stated the times for the workshops were not conducive to working citizens. She felt the start and end has been predetermined. She stated with this project would leave her with a 20-foot front yard with the trail right at the front door. She was opposed to the project.

Matt Thro, 302 N. Main Street, Havana, FL, stated there was a benefit to this project. He noted, Gadsden County has been determined to be one of the least healthy counties in Florida. He spoke in support of the project.

Joan Sanders, 711 First Street, NE, Havana, FL, briefly stated she agrees with the comments from the previous speaker. Spoke in support of the project.

Howard McKinnon, 207 Fairway Drive, Havana FL, stated he would like to see the project move forward to the design phase to provide a better understanding of the project. He stated, this trail has the potential to increase current economic development opportunities. Also noted, this area is already full of cyclist. Spoke in support of the project.

William M. Harvey, 9063 Ridgeview Trail, Tallahassee, discussed the economic benefit of the Florida Arts trail. He agreed with the project being a great connection to the greater trails system in the region. Spoke in support of the project.

Rick Ashton, 9854 Centerville Road, he stated a trail is wanted, but does not want to infringe on property owners. Stated an agreement could be reached to satisfy all parties involved. Spoke in support of the project.

April Williams, FDOT, stated the project currently has no final design and would remain unknown until the design phase. Ms. Williams stated there currently was a paved shoulder along this area, and stated it was not a 'designated' bike lane.

Board Action: Commissioner Merritt made a motion to move forward with FDOT completing the PD&E Study without the task force's recommendations; Authorize CRTPA staff to forward recommendations to be considered within the design phase of the project; direct CRTPA staff to enhance public involvement efforts with any additional phases of the Florida Arts trail. Commissioner Dozier seconded the motion. The motion passed, with Commissioner Viegbesie voting in opposition.

The Ochlockonee Bay Trail – Sopchoppy Alternatives Study expired on April 30, 2016. CRTPA staff is requesting to extend the contract to June 30, 2016 to ensure that options discussed at the Sopchoppy City Council meeting can be pursued and completely vetted.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Adopt a resolution, *Attachment 2*, extending the completion date of the Ochlockonee Bay Trail – Sopchoppy Alternatives Study to June 30, 2016.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

CRTPA and KHA staff has been working with the Sopchoppy City Council to address the connection of the Ochlockonee Bay Trail on Surf Road to the City of Sopchoppy. Since January 1, 2016 data was collected and several options were developed and presented to the Sopchoppy Commissioners on April 21, 2016. There were additional options developed during the meeting that required additional research and discussion with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). However, these options could not be discussed and developed prior to the project completion date of April 30, 2016.

In order to address questions, CRTPA staff, along with KHA (*Attachment 1*), is recommending that a zero-cost extension be provided to June 30, 2016.

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

The Fiscal Years (FYs) 2017 and 2018 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) defines the tasks and anticipated funding requirements for the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) during the fiscal period beginning July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2018. Development of the UPWP is one of the requirements of the metropolitan transportation planning process for the CRTPA.

Consistent with state and federal regulations, the FINAL Fiscal Years 2017 and 2018 UPWP was developed (*Attachment 1*) for CRTPA transmittal to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Agency (FTA) for review and comment on March 22, 2016.

CRTPA COMMITTEE ACTIONS

The CRTPA's two (2) committees (Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee) were scheduled to meet on May 10, 2016. Due to the deadline associated with development and distribution of the CRTPA agenda, any committee recommendations for this and other agenda items will be provided either prior to or at the meeting.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Approve transmittal of the FINAL FYs 2017 and 2018 UPWP to the FDOT, FHWA

and FTA.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

Pursuant to State and Federal requirements, the CRTPA must develop a Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) for the upcoming two state fiscal years (July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2018).

The UPWP describes the transportation planning activities to be undertaken and serves as a work plan to coordinate state and federally funded transportation planning activities. Planning activities identified within the UPWP are largely developed with the use of federal funding, including the following:

- □ Federal Highway Administration (FHWA): Planning (PL)
- □ Federal Transit Administration (FTA): Section 5305D
- □ Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged
- Miscellaneous funding from other sources, such as SU and local funding sources

CRTPA transportation partners – the FDOT and FHWA reviewed the draft UPWP and returned comments. Comments were generally requesting additional information for specific tasks. Some of the requirements for the UPWP have changed since the last biennial cycle. This resulted in the following revisions:

- Identifying the "soft match" which exempts local governments from providing a 10% cash match for PL funding. The soft match is funded by toll credits.
- Also added by staff was information and funding for the Lake Bradford Road/Orange Avenue/Springhill Road Corridor Study.
- The identification of Indirect/Allocated costs is also a new addition to the UPWP. It discusses the methodology used for receiving services from the host government and how the cost is estimated.

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I. INTRODUCTION

The Fiscal Years (FYs) 2017/2018 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) defines the tasks and anticipated funding requirements for the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) during the fiscal period beginning July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2018. This document serves to inform the public, as well as all public officials and departments who contribute resources and allocate funds to the transportation planning process, of the proposed work program for each participating agency. In addition, the UPWP provides the basis for federal funding of transportation planning activities.

Development of this UPWP officially began on January 11, 2016 when the "FYs 2017/2018 UPWP Kick Off Meeting" was held between CRTPA staff, the Florida Department of Transportation (the Federal Highway Administration had been invited but was unable to attend) to discuss the document's development. Consistent with previous years, the UPWP was developed through reviewing and updating tasks contained within the preceding document in coordination with CRTPA staff and outside agencies responsible for the tasks identified within the document. Development of the FYs 2017/2018 UPWP also included a review of the CRTPA's top critical priorities as identified at its past annual retreats and development of tasks to address these priorities. In addition, staff reviewed the requirements related to development of UPWPs as contained within Chapter 3 of the Metropolitan Planning Organization Program Management Handbook.

The draft UPWP was presented to the CRTPA and its subcommittees for comment (March, 2016) and finalized by the CRTPA at its May, 2016 meeting. In addition, the UPWP is posted on the CRTPA's web page (www.crtpa.org). Throughout the year, copies of the document are provided upon request as well as available at public events attended by CRTPA staff.

Subsequent to adoption, the UPWP is reviewed throughout the year to ensure consistency between staff work efforts and tasks identified within the document as well as monitoring work progress and assess the need for possible amendment. The UPWP reflects compliance with the comprehensive Title VI Environmental Justice Procedures. Additionally, the FYs 2017/2018 UPWP was generated to address identified any annual and applicable state and federal Planning Emphasis Areas as detailed in Section II: Organization and Management. Although the CRTPA is in air quality attainment status, CRTPA staff in conjunction with the Florida Department of Transportation continues to monitor the CRTPA's air quality status as well air quality issues.

Brief History of the CRTPA

The UPWP guides transportation planning activities using input from governmental officials, technical experts and citizens. The CRTPA has its origins in the Tallahassee Urban Area Transportation Study (TALUATS), organized in 1965 as a joint undertaking between the City of Tallahassee, Leon County, and the State of Florida. The Tallahassee Urban Area Study Policy Committee was reorganized into the Tallahassee-Leon County Metropolitan Planning Area in 1977 and was reconstituted in 1979 in conformance with Chapter 334.215, Florida Statutes.

In October 2003, the Tallahassee-Leon County Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) approved expansion of its Planning Area Boundary (PAB) to include portions of Gadsden and Wakulla counties. In May 2004, the Tallahassee-Leon County MPO approved an Apportionment

Plan reorganizing into the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA). The Governor approved the Apportionment Plan in August 2004 with subsequent Interlocal Agreements approved during December 2004 and January 2005. CRTPA bylaws were adopted in May 2005. Amendments were made to the Bylaws in November 2006 to reflect the institution of a Management Oversight Committee to provide executive supervision to the CRTPA director and staff. The Bylaws continued to reviewed annually by staff for necessary changes.

In 2007 the CRTPA directed staff to go forward with another expansion of the Planning Area Boundary. The proposed expansion includes the remainders of Wakulla and Gadsden Counties and all of Jefferson County. Interlocal agreements have been executed following approval of the Governor's Office.

STATUS OF COMPREHENSIVE TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ACTIVITIES

The following provides an overview of the status of comprehensive transportation planning activities (includes both CRTPA and transportation partner plans):

- Year 2040 Regional Mobility Plan was adopted by the CRTPA in December 2015. This plan
 identifies roadway, transit, bicycle and pedestrian projects within the CRTPA planning area
 boundary. The Leon County section of bicycle and pedestrian projects contained within this
 plan were identified as part of development of the Tallahassee-Leon County Year 2040
 Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan (discussed below). Other projects will be identified from
 other member jurisdictions. This plan is available for review on the CRTPA's website
 (www.crtpa.org).
- Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan: The Tallahassee-Leon County Year 2025 Bicycle & Pedestrian Master Plan (BPMP) was adopted by the CRTPA on May 17, 2004. The BPMP includes nearly 70 miles of sidewalks, bike facilities and shared use paths for implementation. On September 27, 2005, the CRTPA adopted the Access to Schools to Priority List that provides a more detailed listing to assist within implementation of the BPMP. Initial development of the BPMP occurred prior to the CRTPA's expansion and, as a result, includes only projects within Tallahassee-Leon County. The next update of the BPMP was completed as part of the Regional Mobility Plan in December 2015.
- Transit Development Plan: The FY 2010-2020 Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update was approved by the City of Tallahassee in 2010. This document addresses major needs and suggests alternatives to meet the demand for transit services provided by the City of Tallahassee's StarMetro agency (formerly "Taltran"). Associated with development of the TDP was a broader effort by StarMetro entitled the "Tallahassee Transit Renaissance." The Tallahassee Transit Renaissance, provided a framework to meet community needs for a better transit system through focusing on the following six (6) areas: communications/image; technology; service; facilities/amenities; revenue opportunities and transit excellence. Section 7.2 (Transit Planning) provides detail regarding current and future planning efforts.

- Tallahassee International Airport Master Plan: The Tallahassee Regional Airport Master Plan was originally adopted in 1973 and has been updated several times. An Update to the Master Plan was developed and received by the Tallahassee City Commission in the summer of 2006. This update will cover a 20-year period. It was sent to FDOT and the Federal Aviation Administration for review. Final acceptance was in the third quarter of 2007. The Master Plan and Updates provide guidance for development of the Airport to meet the forecasted needs for facilities and infrastructure to provide commercial airline and general aviation services to the Tallahassee Region. In 2015 Tallahassee Regional Airport was designated Tallahassee International Airport.
- Leon County Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan: This five-year plan includes a service analysis and implementation plan for transportation disadvantaged services within Leon County. The annual update to this plan was approved on April 11, 2011 and is available for review on the CRTPA's website (www.crtpa.org). The Community Transportation Coordinator, StarMetro had its contract re-approved through 2017. As a result a new plan was completed in January 2013. The CRTPA is the official planning agency of the Leon County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board (TDCB), who oversees the provision of transportation-disadvantaged services within Leon County. As with all TDSPs it is reviewed annually and amended as needed.
- Gadsden County Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan: Originally adopted on January 16, 2008, the plan's annual update was approved in June 2013. The Apalachee Regional Planning Agency (ARPC) was the official planning agency of the Gadsden County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board (TDCB). As of July 1, 2013, the CRTPA became the designated Official Planning Agency. The TDSP is updated annually. The next major plan will be developed in 2018.
- <u>Jefferson County Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan</u> Originally adopted on January 16, 2008, the plan's update was approved in June 2013. The Apalachee Regional Planning Agency (ARPC) was the official planning agency of the Jefferson County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board (TDCB). As of July 1, 2013 the CRTPA became the designated Official Planning Agency. The TDSP is updated annually and the next major update will be developed in 2018.
- Wakulla County Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan: Originally adopted on January 16, 2007 the plan's initial adoption date was approved in June 2012. The Apalachee Regional Planning Agency (ARPC) was the official planning agency of the Wakulla County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board (TDCB). As of July 1, 2013 the CRTPA is the designated Official Planning Agency. During FY 16 the contract for the Community Transportation Coordinator (Wakulla Senior Services) with the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged expired. Staff began and completed the recommendation process on April 8, 2016, which will result in the Florida Commission for TD issuing a contract for an additional five years to Wakulla Senior Services. A new service development

plan must be completed within 120 days of the new 5 year contract execution, which is July 1, 2016.

<u>Local Government Comprehensive Plans</u>: The following local government comprehensive plans are within the CRTPA's planning area boundary:

The transportation/traffic circulation elements of these local government comprehensive plans were updated as needed to reflect the CRTPA's recent adoption of the LRTP in December 2015.

FYs 2015/2016 TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ACTIVITIES

During FYs 2015/2016 transportation planning activities undertaken by the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) included continued implementation of the Year 2040 Long Range Transportation Plan and continued implementation of the adopted Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan through adoption of the Access to Schools Priority List. The following contains a summary of these and other transportation planning activities and accomplishments undertaken by the CRTPA:

- Development of findings, direction and priorities from CRTPA Retreat (October and April, when needed);
- FYs 2015 FY 2020 Priority Project Lists adoption (September);
- FYs 2015 -FY 2020 Transportation Improvement Program adoption (June);
- Development and adoption of FYs 2013/2014 Unified Planning Work Program (November May);
- Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plans were adopted in:
 - Gadsden: August 21, 2012 by Gadsden County

Wakulla: July 17, 2012 by Wakulla County

• Jefferson: January 17, 2013 by Jefferson County

Implementation and identification of projects continued through FY 16.

- Adoption of Safe Routes to Schools Priority List for Leon County (May, 2014) and with adoption of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plans in Wakulla, Jefferson, and Gadsden Counties;
- Enhanced use of the CRTPA's webpage (www.crtpa.org) as a tool for information placement and dispersal (including meeting agendas and agenda items; staff and member contacts);

PLANNING PRIORITIES

Project priorities are consistent with the CRTPA Regional Mobility Plan (RMP) and FDOT's adopted Five Year Work Program in the following areas:

- Roadways Priority Project List (PPL)
- RMP PPL Bicycle and Pedestrian Projects
- Strategic Intermodal System (SIS)
- Transportation Systems Management

Other

- Transportation Alternative (through solicitation by CRTPA and ranked by a committee)
- Star Metro
- Tallahassee International Airport (Master Plan update to begin in 2017)

PLANNING TASKS

In FYs 2017/2018, CRTPA staff will focus on a comprehensive range of planning activities to be performed with funds under Titles 23 United States Code and Title 49 United States Code. These planning activities reflect the CRTPA's priorities and include the following:

Multimodal Planning (Task 1.1: Transportation Planning Management; Task 4.1: TIP, Task 2.1: Data Collection and Distribution, Task 7.1: Bicycle and Pedestrian Planning, Task 7.2: Transit Planning, Task 8.1: CRTPA Coordination) Consistent with the CRTPA's planning priorities, planning activities will include a focus on multimodal planning efforts. Such tasks include addressing the linkage between adopted plans and funding; development of the Project Priority Lists in a manner ensuring all modes receive funding consideration through the ranking process; active coordination with transit providers including StarMetro; and the implementation of BPMP projects. Additionally, continued education efforts will be made regarding the importance of multimodalism.

Regional Mobility Plan/Long Range Transportation Plan (Task 3.1: UPWP, Task 5.1: LRTP, Task 8.1: CRTPA Coordination). The Year 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) was adopted in FY 2010. In FYs 2009/10, CRTPA staff coordinated with CRTPA local governments regarding provision of Year 2035 LRTP information for incorporation in local government comprehensive plans. Additionally, projects contained within the LRTP have been added to the CRTPA's project priority list for funding consideration. The current Regional Master Plan was adopted in 2015. As with past plans, all modes of transportation are considered for a longer-range period than the LRTP – 50 years or more.

<u>Public Involvement</u> (Task 6.1: Public Involvement): Activities related to informing the public about the metropolitan planning process as well as the programs and plans of the CRTPA will continue within the CRTPA planning area. Such activities include participation in regional events, development of CRTPA newsletters, placement of current information on the CRTPA's website (<u>www.crtpa.org</u>), conducting public CRTPA meetings to receive input and the use of local media related to CRTPA meetings and programs. Public involvement will also include actively seeking input from the traditionally underserved from the region's population.

Efficient Transportation Decision Making (Task 2.1: Data Collection and Distribution; Task 6.1: CRTPA Coordination): Consistent with the adoption of the Year 2040 LRTP in FY 2015, ETDM eligible projects will continue to be entered into the ETDM Planning Screen. Additionally, CRTPA project already in the ETDM process will continue to be advanced consistent with programmed project activities. The collection of socioeconomic data will continue related to CRTPA ETDM projects.

<u>Transportation Disadvantaged Planning</u> (Task 7.1: Transportation Disadvantaged) Continuation of the CRTPA's role as the lead planning organization for transportation disadvantaged planning within Leon County will continue. In July of 2013 the CRTPA became the designated Official Planning Agency for all counties within the CRTPA boundary, in compliance with statutes.

Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS)/Data Compilation (Task 2.1: Data Collection and Distribution and Task 6.1: CRTPA Coordination): ITS coordination will continue as needed and consistent with CRTPA adoption of a regional ITS Architecture including the sharing of information and projects contained within the adopted FDOT Work Program with local transportation agencies. Data compilation activities will continue related to transportation projects and potential impacts to man-made communities and the natural environment, including as related to the ETDM process.

LEVEL OF PLANNING EFFORT

The tasks contained within this UPWP reflect the transportation needs of the CRTPA as identified in the CRTPA's plans and programs, as well as priorities explicitly identified by the CRTPA. As identified within the adopted Year 2040 LRTP, the transportation needs of the CRTPA exceed available resources for all modes of travel. This UPWP addresses these limited resources by focusing the CRTPA's planning efforts on the provision of a continuing, cooperative and comprehensive process to ensure adequate public involvement and mobility choices within the CRTPA.

II. ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

The Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) is the region's Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and consists of voting representatives from:

- Leon County
- The Leon County School Board
- Gadsden County
- Jefferson County (includes voting for Monticello)
- Wakulla County
- · The City of Chattahootchee
- · The City of Gretna
- · The City of Midway
- Town of Havana
- The City of Tallahassee

The apportionment of the membership of the CRTPA is based on population distribution among the members and is weighted as follows:

memorandum to the CRTPA Chair dated November 29, 2005, the City of Tallahassee changed its membership
on the CRTPA from five (5) members to three (3) members.

The originally approved apportionment of the CRTPA is the result of actions initiated in October 13, 2003, when the Tallahassee-Leon County Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) approved a revised Planning Area Boundary to include portions of Wakulla and Gadsden Counties, the Cities of Midway and Quincy and the Town of Havana. Subsequently, on May 17, 2004, the MPO approved an Apportionment Plan in accordance with the revised Planning Area Boundary. On June 21, 2004, the MPO approved a resolution changing its name to the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA). The Governor of Florida approved the apportionment plan on August 17, 2004. Subsequently the CRTPA moved to expand the planning area boundary to include all of Gadsden, Wakulla, and Jefferson counties. The Governor approved the new apportionment plan to include all four counties in March 2011. A map of the CRTPA's planning area boundary is located on the last page of this document.

Since the approval of the new apportionment plan, CRTPA completed the full execution of new interlocal agreements. A Staff Services Agreement between CRTPA and the City of Tallahassee was Agreement in April 2012.

Subsequent to the Governors approval of the Apportionment Plan, the CRTPA voted on November 15, 2004, to approve an updated Interlocal Agreement reflecting the new apportionment and structure of the MPO. This agreement was ultimately approved by all CRTPA member governments between December 4, 2004 and January 6, 2005. Bylaws governing the CRTPA were adopted on May 23, 2005. The following contains a listing of current CRTPA agreements:

- Interlocal Agreement: The original Interlocal Agreement establishing the Tallahassee-Leon County MPO (currently called "The Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency") was executed in 1975. The current interlocal agreement ("Interlocal Agreement For the Creation of the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency") was established on November 15, 2004. The by-laws were amended in November of 2006 to create an Executive Director Management Oversight Committee. The latest update was adopted and executed on March 13, 2014
- <u>Transportation Planning Funds Joint Participation Agreement</u>: The "Transportation Planning Funds Joint Participation Agreement" between the CRTPA and the FDOT was approved by the CRTPA on July 1, 2010. This agreement relates to the preparation and adoption of the UPWP supported by PL funds.

^{***}By virtue of an agreement between members, the City of Midway representative votes on behalf of the City of Midway, the City of Quincy, and the Town of Havana (5 votes).

- Intergovernmental Coordination and Review and Public Transportation Coordination Joint Project Agreement: This agreement between the FDOT, CRTPA, the Apalachee Regional Planning Council (ARPC), City of Tallahassee TalTran (now "StarMetro"), City of Tallahassee Regional Airport and the Quincy-Gadsden Airport Authority was approved by the CRTPA on September 27, 2005. The purpose of this agreement is to provide for coordination with public transit operators, as well as to provide a process through the ARPC for intergovernmental coordination and review and identification of inconsistencies between proposed CRTPA transportation plans and local government plans. This agreement also provides a process for conflict and dispute resolution through the ARPC.
- Public Transportation Joint Participation Agreement: This agreement between the CRTPA
 and the FDOT to fund the Section 5305D Grant was executed on February 7, 2005 and again
 in FY 11. The agreement's purpose is to fund the Section 5305D grant as identified in the
 CRTPA's UPWP.

The CRTPA has two (2) advisory committees: the Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee (CMAC), and the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC). The focus of each CRTPA committee differs with the CMAC being comprised of individuals in the community and includes representatives of various agencies and transportation interests. The TAC provides the CRTPA technical advice as it consists of professionals involved in transportation issues. The advisory committees meet approximately two (2) weeks prior to regularly scheduled CRTPA meetings in order to ensure that their recommendations are incorporated in CRTPA agenda items and provided to CRTPA members in a timely manner. The bylaws for the two (2) advisory committees are available for review on the CRTPA website (www.crtpa.org).

CRTPA PARTICIPANTS IN UPWP METROPOLITAN PLANNING PROCESS

The following provides a discussion of CRTPA participants in the UPWP metropolitan area transportation planning process:

• CRTPA Member Governments and Agencies: Transit related tasks in the UPWP are closely coordinated with the City of Tallahassee's StarMetro agency (Task 7.2: Transit Planning), Airport related task are developed in coordination with the City of Tallahassee's International Airport (Task 7.3: Aviation Planning), data collection tasks related to signal timing, crash surveillance and ITS are closely coordinated with the City of Tallahassee Public Works Department and Leon County Public Works Department (Task 2.1: Data Collection and Distribution). Additionally, the CRTPA coordinates with member governments regarding other regional transportation issues as well as to receive adopted capital improvements program for inclusion within the CRTPA's TIP. CRTPA member government transportation related departments (such as public works, planning, public safety and growth management) also serve on the CRTPA's Technical Advisory Committee. As noted above, the following are the member governments and agencies of the CRTPA: Tallahassee-Leon County, Gadsden County, Wakulla County, Town of Havana, City of

Midway, City of Quincy, and Leon County School Board. The addition of Jefferson County and all of Wakulla County and their municipalities was approved with completion of the interlocal agreements and approval by the Governor's Office in 2011.

- Federal Highway Administration (FHWA): The CRTPA works closely with the FHWA on all
 issues of the metropolitan area planning process including program documents and funding
 issues. A representative from FHWA is invited to sit at the discussion table with the CRTPA
 in an advisory, ex-officio capacity.
- <u>Florida Department of Transportation District 3 (FDOT D-3)</u>: The CRTPA works closely with FDOT D-3 on all issues of the metropolitan area planning process. They are an ex-officio member of the CRTPA Board.
- Florida Department of Transportation Central Office: The CRTPA receives guidance from the FDOT Central Office on issues largely related to policy, FDOT programs and the Efficient Transportation Decision Making process.
- <u>Federal Transit Administration (FTA)</u>: The CRTPA coordinates with the FTA on issues related to transit including UPWP tasks as well as participation in the TMA certification process.
- Apalachee Regional Planning Council (ARPC): The ARPC serves on the CRTPA's Technical Advisory Committee. Until July 1, 2013 they were the designated Official Planning Agency for Jefferson, Wakulla, and Gadsden Counties.
- <u>Commuter Services of North Florida (CSNF)</u>: CSNF has a staff member liaison on the CRTPA's Technical Advisory Committee. The CRTPA is an ex-officio member of the CSNF Board of Directors and coordinates with the CSNF on issues related to providing mobility options within the CRTPA region including the annual Commuter Choices Week event.
- Blueprint 2000 (BP 2000): BP 2000 has a liaison on the CRTPA's Technical Advisory Committee. The CRTPA coordinates with BP 2000 on regional transportation issues and projects being implemented by BP 2000. In addition, the CRTPA has staff representation on the BP 2000 Technical Advisory Committee.

CRTPA CERTIFICATION STATUS (FEDERAL AND STATE)

As a Transportation Management Area (TMA), the CRTPA is federally certified every four (4) years by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA). This four-year cycle is based on the adoption of the Federal transportation bill (MAP-21). A TMA is an urbanized area, as defined by the U.S. Census, with a population of over 200,000. In general, the review consists of three (3) primary activities: a site visit, review of planning documents (in advance of and during the site visit), and preparation of a report summarizing the review and offering findings. The review focuses on compliance with federal regulations and the challenges, successes, and experiences of the cooperative relationship between the MPO, FDOT and transit operator (StarMetro) in the conduct of the metropolitan planning process. The CRTPA is presently certified through 2017.

In addition to TMA certification, the CRTPA is certified annually by the FDOT. The Annual State Certification of the CRTPA occurred in February with the results presented to the CRTPA. Findings of the Joint Certifications are located on the documents page of the CRTPA's website (www.crtpa.org)

CRTPA OPERATING PROCEDURES AND BYLAWS

CRTPA funds are administered through the City of Tallahassee's Accounting Services Division. Associated with the administration of these funds is the development of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) of the City of Tallahassee. Included within the CAFR is the Single Audit Element developed by an independent auditor. Within this element is the listing of Federal Awards including funds from FTA and FDOT developed in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, as required by Section 3.8.6 (1) of the MPO Program Management Handbook. Associated with the administration of these funds is the development of an indirect cost rate that is applied to CRTPA program budgets. Local government matching funds required for Section 5305D funds received by the CRTPA are split among member governments of the CRTPA consistent with the CRTPA Interlocal agreement.

The CRTPA's adopted bylaws contain information related to the funding of the CRTPA. This information includes a discussion of member governments paying a proportional share of the operating costs of the CRTPA over and above the amount provided by state and federal sources. The bylaws provide that CRTPA staff will only perform those services required by applicable federal code and state statute. Additionally, the bylaws identify the UPWP as the "de facto" budget of the CRTPA.

A "Staff Services and Fiscal Memorandum of Agreement" between the "Tallahassee-Leon County Metropolitan Planning Organization", City of Tallahassee, and Leon County was originally executed in 1978 and updated as needed. The last update was executed in 2012. This agreement addresses staffing and fiscal administration issues.

The CRTPA does not currently lease any equipment.

MOVING AHEAD FOR PROGRESS IN THE 21ST CENTURY ACT (MAP-21)

The MAP-21 program requires an MPO to consider the following planning factors as transportation plans are developed:

- 1. Advancing Multi-Modal Transportation Planning Freight Planning
- 2. Advancing Multi-Modal Transportation Planning Transit Planning
- 3. Advancing Multi-Modal Transportation Complete Streets
- 4. Advancing Multi-Modal Transportation Bicycle/Pedestrian Planning

Federal Planning Emphasis Areas

- 5. FAST Implementation Regional Models of Cooperation ensure a regional approach to transportation planning by CRTPA working with its transportation partners, thinking beyond the traditional boundaries of counties and states.
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;
- 7. FAST Implementation: Transition to Performance Based Planning and Programming.
- 8. Emphasize preservation of the existing transportation system.

9. Ladders of Opportunity - Access to essential services – as part of the transportation planning process, identify transportation connectivity gaps in access to essential services.

FDOT DISTRICT 3 PLANNING ACTIVITIES

The FHWA Division Office has requested a task or section be included in each MPOs UPWP that identify the District Planning activities to be performed (with Federal or State funds) that will benefit the MPO. FDOT District 3 has listed the following information for incorporation in the UPWP:

- Planning and Corridor Studies
- System Planning and Reviews
- ETDM/Community Impact
- Analysis of Statistics
- Federal Function Classification
- Traffic Counts Program
- Modal Development Technical Assistance
- Safety Assessments and Audits.
- Review proposed local government comprehensive plan amendments, and the Evaluation and Appraisal Reports.
- Coordinate the review of Economic Development Transportation Fund applications for transportation related issues.
- Identify opportunities to add bicycle and sidewalk accommodations to resurfacing and capacity projects. Identify pedestrian needs at intersections and provide improvements as funding allows.
- Provide technical assistance to the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency in support of the tasks associated with the FHWA PL funds.
- Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Jim Boxold has committed to reducing the number of pedestrian and bicycle crashes occurring annually within Florida. The FDOT has initiated a safety campaign focused in this area and has adopted specific

• Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Jim Boxold has committed to reducing the number of pedestrian and bicycle crashes occurring annually within Florida. The FDOT has initiated a safety campaign focused in this area and has adopted specific policies and strategies to address this issue within the Florida Strategic Highway Safety Plan and the Florida Pedestrian and Bicycle Strategic Safety Plan. Reducing pedestrian and bicycle crashes are a state wide issue requiring commitment, cooperation and coordination with multiple partners. The planning emphasis area this year is intended to focus and strengthen the planning process between the partners regarding the safety of pedestrian and bicyclist using our state wide transportation system. The CRTPA will to the maximum extent possible integrate this emphasis area into its relevant plans.

Matching Funds/Soft Match

PL and SU Funding

Currently, the state provides 100 percent of the required match to secure FHWA funds, including PL and SU funds, with Toll Credits in place of local funds. For FY 2017 the soft match is estimated to be \$52, 148 for PL funds and \$20,000 for SU funds. FY 2018 the soft match is estimated to be \$51,703 for PL and \$10,000 for SU, depending on the progress of projects that are being funded by SU dollars.

Federal Transit Administration

A ten percent local match is required for funding provided by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) under the 5305D Program. The state contributes ten percent of the required match. FTA provides 80%.

Transportation Disadvantaged Program

The State of Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged provides funding for required planning support provided by the CRTPA. No match is required. The grant is "lump sum" and payment is based upon deliverables.

III. WORK ELEMENTS SECTION

UPWP WORK ELEMENTS DESCRIPTION

Tasks within the FYs 2017/2018 UPWP are organized into the following sections:

Section 1: Program Administration (Tasks 1.1, 1.2, 1.3 1.4, 1.5, 1.6, 1.7) - Includes those functions necessary for proper management of the transportation planning process on a continuing basis, including agenda development, travel, training, CRTPA certification, capital outlay and funding administration.

Section 5: Long Range Transportation Plan (Task 5.1) – Contains tasks associated with development of the LRTP.

Section 6: Community Involvement (Task 6.1) – Contains tasks related to the provision of public information about the CRTPA's plans and programs.

Section 7: Systems Planning (Tasks 7.1, 7.2, 7.3, 7.4 and 7.5) – Contains recurring planning studies/projects related to bicycle and pedestrian, transit, airport, transportation disadvantaged and mobility management issues.

Section 8: CRTPA Coordination (Task 8.1) – Addresses tasks related to coordination between the CRTPA and its transportation partners.

Section 9: Other Planning Projects (Tasks 9.1 and 9.2) – Contains tasks associated special CRTPA projects as well as specific corridor studies.

Allocated/Indirect Costs

The CRTPA, as part of their Staff Services Agreement with its host government – the City of Tallahassee provides allocated cost funding for the following support items:

- Accounting and Budgeting Services, which includes accounts receivable, accounts payable, accounting support, and technical expertise in the area of financial operations. It also includes a true-up process with Leon County Board of County Commissioners
- · Procurement and Purchasing

At the time the UPWP was drafted the allocated cost was 20.32 percent. Historically, while it may vary from year to year its variance has not been more than 1-4%.

The approved City of Tallahassee Cost Allocation Plan has been submitted to the Florida Department of Transportation as a separate deliverable, due to its size. It is evaluated as part of the single audit – also known as the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP)

Task 5.1: Long Range Transportation Plan Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan (RMP)

Purpose:

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

Consistent with state and federal requirements, the DRAFT Fiscal Year (FY) 2017—FY 2021 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) has been developed (a link to the document can be found on the agency's webpage: http://crtpa.org/2016-tip.html) for Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) transmittal to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) for review.

CRTPA COMMITTEE ACTIONS

The CRTPA's two (2) committees (Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee) were scheduled to meet on May 10, 2016. Due to the deadline associated with development and distribution of the CRTPA agenda, any committee recommendations for this and other agenda items will be provided prior to or at the meeting.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Approve transmittal of the Draft FY 2017 – FY 2021 TIP to the Florida Department of Transportation for review.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

The CRTPA Transportation Improvement Program identifies regional transportation projects (roadway, bicycle and pedestrian, transportation systems management, transportation enhancement, public transportation, aviation, resurfacing and bridge projects) that have received funding in the Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) Draft Five-Year Work Program. The TIP is developed in accordance with 23 U.S.C. 134(h), 23 CFR 450 and Chapter 339.175(7), F.S., and is one of the annual requirements of the metropolitan transportation planning process for the CRTPA.

The purpose of the TIP is to inform the public and governmental agencies of transportation projects (planning through construction) that have received funding during the next five-year period (FY 2017 – FY 2021) within our region (Gadsden, Jefferson, Leon and Wakulla counties).

Projects contained within the DRAFT FY 2017 – FY 2021 TIP reflect those projects that were presented to the CRTPA Board on October 19, 2015 by the FDOT District 3 during their presentation of the FDOT Draft FY 2017– FY 2021 Five-Year Work Program.

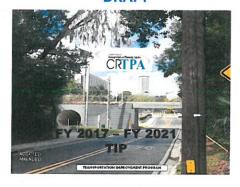

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

The CRTPA must de-obligate SU funds from the adopted Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) so they will be available on July 1, 2016

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Approve the resolution

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

CRTPA funding is received from various funding sources, most of which have strict guidelines on its administration and management. At the April meeting, the CRTPA amended the adopted FYs 2014-2016 UPWP to accept \$150,000 of SU funds for the Orange Avenue/Springhill Road/Lake Bradford Road transportation planning study. The funds became available in this budget year and it was prudent to obligate them as soon as they were available.

The CRTPA is in the final months of its budget year, so only a small amount (\$15,000) of that \$150,000 will be needed between now and June 30. To have access to the remainder of the funding on July 1, 2016, the Florida Department of Transportation requires that we de-obligate the remaining \$135,000.

De-obligation is not "giving back" or "returning" the money to the FDOT. It does not indicate that the CRTPA has no need for the funding; rather it's the most efficient mechanism for rolling the funds forward for expenditure in Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

This process requires a resolution from the CRTPA, which is included as Attachment 1.

PREVIOUS WORK (FY 2013/2014)

CRTPA participated in coordination and monitoring of the following projects:

- Welaunee Boulevard and Interstate 10 Interchange: The project has been ongoing for several
 years with the initiation of the Interstate 10 Master Plan Update. The CRTPA was involved
 with an initial transportation distribution study to update SE data to incorporate the project
 into the Interstate 10 Master Plan and subsequent Interchange Re-evaluation. Additionally,
 the City of Tallahassee initiated a study to evaluate the impacts of the Welaunee Plantation on
 the transportation system and the potential to incorporate the interchange into the plan.
- Crawfordville Road (US 319, Wakulla Springs Road to US 98) Re-Evaluation: The Study being
 completed to address transportation issues related to the growth of Wakulla County and the
 opportunities available to relieve congestion along the corridor.
- Woodville Highway (Capital Circle, SE to Paul Russell Road) PD&E and Design: The PD&E Study
 was complete in FY 13/14, and has transitioned into Design for a four lane section and oneway loop.
- 6th Avenue Sidewalks (Tallahassee Monroe Street to Gadsden Street): The CRTPA worked with the City of Tallahassee to construct sidewalks on 6th Avenue (Monroe Street to Gadsden Street) and along Gadsden Street (6th Avenue to Ingleside Avenue).
- Lafayette Street Sidewalks (Cascades Park to Winchester Lane): CRTPA staff worked with the
 City of Tallahassee and Leon County to re-construct and construct sidewalks along the corridor
 in conjunction with drainage and streetscaping projects.
- Florida Arts Trail (Main Street US 27 to Downtown Quincy: The CRTPA is coordinating with Gadsden County to develop the trail along with the introduction of a wide-shoulder to be constructed as a component of a current resurfacing project scheduled for FY 14/15.

- Ochlockonee Bay Trail (Mashes Sands to Sopchoppy): CRTPA coordinated with Wakulla County and the FDOT to complete several phases of the project and fund the last segment on US 319 from Surf Road to Rose Street in Sopchoppy.
- Capital City to the Sea Trails: Staff initiated a Master Plan March 2013 that was completed in March 2014 to develop a trail system that strengths the linkage between Leon County and Wakulla County. The initial PD&E kicked-off in March 2014 with an estimated completion date of March 2015.

METHODOLOGY (FY 2015)

CRTPA will continue coordination efforts with FDOT, BP2000, consultants and CRTPA member governments related to corridor studies within the CRTPA region. Coordination efforts include participation in public meetings, agency working groups, consultant selection, provision of information to CRTPA and other activities as required by the MPO process.

The CRTPA will continue to participate in the region's corridor studies during FY 15

METHODOLOGY (FY 2016)

CRTPA will continue coordination efforts with FDOT, BP2000, consultants and CRTPA member governments related to corridor studies within the CRTPA region. Coordination efforts include participation in public meetings, agency working groups, consultant selection, provision of information to CRTPA and other activities as required by the MPO process.

In April 2016 the CRTPA received funding to begin the West Orange Avenue (SR 371/SR 373); Springhill Road (CR 2203/SR 373) and Lake Bradford Road (CR 2205/SR 371) Planning Study. The study will continue into the FYs17/18 UPWP.

In addition to representing a special interest, both applicants are women, which is another voice that needs strengthening on the committee to achieve balance.

CITIZENS MULTIMODAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE Bylaws



PREAMBLE

The Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) supports full and timely public participation in the transportation decision-making process of the CRTPA. To ensure that participation is reflective of the cross section of residents and interests within the CRTPA area, it has created a Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee (CMAC) to advise the CRTPA Board.

The following sets forth the Bylaws that guide the proper functioning of the urban transportation planning process for the CMAC of the CRTPA.

ARTICLE I: NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1. NAME

The name of this committee shall be the Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee (CMAC).

Section 2. PURPOSE

This Committee was established by the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) in May 2012. The tasks of this Committee shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- a. Provide independent citizen advice to the CRTPA Board on issues related to the transportation planning processes in the CRTPA region. This includes but is not limited to: the Long Range Transportation Plan, Unified Planning Work Program, Priority Project Lists, Transportation Improvement Program, Public Involvement Plan, and other regionally significant transportation related issues and projects as requested.
- b. Provide advice to the CRTPA from a balanced mobility perspective considering the needs and safety of all transportation users and modes of transportation in the CRTPA region within fiscal and physical constraints.
- c. Promote equity in the regional transportation planning process.
- d. Promote public awareness and participation in the regional transportation planning process within the region and from professional and citizen-based organizations and employers.
- e. Review and evaluate CRTPA issues as requested by the CRTPA Board, or CRTPA staff.



ARTICLE II: ORGANIZATION

Section 1. AREA

The Committee shall represent and serve the CRTPA area, which encompasses all of Gadsden, Jefferson, Leon, and Wakulla counties.

Section 2. AUTHORITY

Pursuant to 23 USC 134, 49 USC 5303, 23 CFR 450, and Section 339.175 (6)(e), Florida Statutes, the CMAC is statutorily formulated. The CMAC is also governed by the policies and guidelines set forth by the CRTPA.

Section 3. NONDISCRIMINATION

No organization or person shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, creed, or handicap, be excluded from participating in, be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination from the CMAC.

ARTICLE III: MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. MEMBERSHIP

As designated by the CRTPA on March 26, 2012, the CMAC will consist of voting representatives as follows:

- One (1) citizen representatives for each voting CRTPA Board Member
- One (1) member from the Florida Office of Greenways and Trails
- One (1) member from Commuter Services of North Florida
- One (1) member from the Florida Department of Health
- One (1) member per special interest as outlined below, if such representation is not otherwise provided within the CRTPA and organizational appointments.

Minorities Road Bicyclists

Persons with Disabilities Off-Road Bicyclists

Seniors Senior Pedestrians

Transit Riders Child/Youth Pedestrian Advocates

Student Interests Transportation Disadvantaged



Section 2. GEOGRAPHICAL AND SPECIAL INTEREST BALANCE

The CMAC shall represent and serve the CRTPA area, which encompasses all of Gadsden, Jefferson, Leon, and Wakulla Counties. The CMAC will be made up of a cross-section of citizens throughout the four-county region. Pursuant to Section 339.175(e), Florida Statutes, the membership on the citizen's advisory committee must reflect a broad cross-section of local residents with an interest in the development of an efficient, safe, and cost-effective transportation system. Minorities, the elderly, and the handicapped must be adequately represented. The CRTPA Executive Director or his /her designee may appoint up to four (4) members to the CMAC with approval of the CRTPA Board to balance the geographical or special interest/diversity of the committee.

Section 3. TERMS OF MEMBERSHIP AND APPOINTMENT PROCEDURES
Terms of membership are based on the calendar year, and are renewable each
January 1 of any given year, regardless of when appointments were made.
Further details of term conditions are outlined below.

a. Citizen Appointments

Citizen members of the CMAC shall serve renewable terms at the pleasure of the CRTPA Board Member who appoints them. Terms are reconsidered for renewal at the end of each calendar year, no later than the November CRTPA Meeting, and with new appointments being active in January of the next calendar year. Should an appointing entity no longer serve on the CRTPA, their representative to the CMAC will cease to serve on the CMAC. A new citizen member will be appointed by the new CRTPA Board Member, or the new CRTPA Board Member can choose to reappoint the previous citizen representative if appropriate.

b. Organization Appointments

Members who serve as representatives of specific organizations spelled out in the Bylaws serve continuous terms. Replacements are made by the member organization that provided their participation.

c. Special Interest Appointments

Members who are representing special interests within the CRTPA Region are identified by the CRTPA Executive Director or his/her designee and appointed to the CMAC by the CRTPA Board as a whole. Terms of service are two-year terms from the date they were appointed.

d. Balancing Appointments

The CMAC must reflect a balanced cross-section of interests, population demographics, and geographical areas. Four (4) member positions are available at the discretion of CRTPA Executive Director or his/her designee to appoint interested citizens to serve if they improve a deficiency currently existing on the CMAC, subject to the approval of the

CRTPA Board. Terms are renewable each calendar year.

Section 4. NON-VOTING MEMBERS

In addition to appointed CMAC members, the CMAC seeks representation from local organizations as non-voting liaisons. Examples of such organizations include:

Colleges and Universities

Law Enforcement

Community Traffic Safety Teams

Local Government Public Works/
Engineering

Section 5. VACANCIES

CRTPA staff collects applications to serve on the CMAC. When vacancies exist, the CRTPA Executive Director or his/her designee will review the current demographics and representation on the committee and advise the appointing entity of any specific representation that is needed. Applications will be forwarded to CRTPA Board Members in consideration of their appointments, but they are not required to select from the pool of applicants. However, anyone serving on the CMAC must have a completed application on file while serving on the committee.

Section 6. REAPPOINTMENTS

CMAC members serve at the pleasure of their appointing entity and may be replaced at any time. However, members who have lost their appointment due to absenteeism may only be reappointed to a vacancy under the following circumstances:

- a. The appointing entity deems circumstances surrounding the absenteeism to be extenuating.
- b. The extenuating circumstances and reappointment request are approved by the CRTPA Board as a whole.
- c. Members who are seeking reappointment, but who lost membership due to absenteeism more than twelve months ago are not subject to the terms of a) or b) above.



Section 7. RESIGNATIONS

CMAC members are expected to send written notice of intent to resign their position to the CRTPA Executive Director, and to their appointing entity as soon as practical, but at least one (1) month prior to their expected resignation from attendance at any meeting, if possible.

Members representing organizations should send a written request to their organization that a replacement should be made. Additionally, they are expected to notify the CRTPA Executive Director that they will no longer be able to serve on the CMAC and have requested a replacement.

ARTICLE IV: VOTING

Section 1. VOTING AUTHORITY

Only the appointed members, or their alternates, are entitled to vote at any meeting of the CMAC.

Section 2. VOTING WEIGHT

Each CMAC member shall have one vote. Votes shall be weighted equally.

Section 3. ALTERNATES

If a member, other than a citizen appointee, is unable to attend meeting(s), an alternate may vote in his/her stead on the following conditions:

- a. The member is representing an organization.
- b. CRTPA staff must be notified ahead of the meeting that the alternate is attending.
- c. The alternate must be from the same organization as the absent member.

Section 4. QUORUM

A majority of the appointed members of the CMAC shall constitute a quorum. In the absence of a quorum at any regularly scheduled meeting, the members present shall function as a full subcommittee, electing an interim chair, if necessary, and the consensus of the group, as determined by a majority vote per item, is forwarded to the CRTPA as a recommendation without a quorum.

- a. 40% of the appointed members of the CMAC (excluding liaisons), including at least one member from a jurisdiction other than Tallahassee or Leon County shall constitute a quorum. An affirmative vote shall consist of a majority vote of the total quorum present.
- b. In the absence of a quorum at any scheduled meeting, the members present shall function as a full subcommittee, electing an interim chair, if necessary, and the consensus of the group, as determined by a majority vote per item, is forwarded to the CRTPA Board as a recommendation without a quorum.

ARTICLE V: REGULAR AND SPECIAL MEETINGS

Section 1. MEETING SCHEDULE

Regular meetings will be held no less frequently than every two months, or six times a year, based on the meeting schedule of the CRTPA. The regular meeting of the CMAC is held no more than three weeks in advance of and no less than one week prior to the CRTPA Meeting of any given month. Meeting dates will be adjusted by the Chairperson or CRTPA Staff to accommodate holidays or other conflicts.

Section 2. MEETING ATTENDANCE

Each member of the CMAC is expected to demonstrate interest in the CMAC's activities through attendance at the regularly scheduled meetings except for reasons of an unavoidable nature. The CRTPA Executive Director may recommend the removal of any member who fails to attend or arrange for an alternate to attend, three or more meetings in a one-year period. A request for removal and replacement of any CMAC member shall be sent to the appointing agency or governmental unit from the CRTPA Executive Director.

Section 3. MEETING LOCATION

Regular meetings of the CMAC shall be held at a location agreed to by the members and accessible by the public.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS

Special meetings may be called by the Chairperson or CRTPA Staff.

Section 5. MEETING NOTIFICATION

- a. Notice of the time, place and purpose of all regular meetings shall be provided to each member of the Committee, not less than five (5) days before such meeting. Special meetings will provide notice not less than three (3) days before such meeting.
- b. Regular CMAC meetings shall be advertised on the CRTPA web site at least one week prior to the scheduled meeting date. Special CMAC Meetings will provide notice not less than three (3) days before the special meeting date.
- c. Meetings will be open to the public. Any group which so requests in writing will be notified of CMAC meetings.

Section 6. MEETING MATERIALS

- a. Agenda materials for CMAC meetings shall be distributed no later than seven (7) days prior to the meeting, unless otherwise decided by the Chairperson. Supplemental materials shall be provided to the CMAC members as soon as practicable.
- b. Agenda materials are posted on the CRTPA website at least one week prior to the scheduled meeting date.

Section 7. MEETING MINUTES

CMAC meetings will be recorded and minutes will be prepared. CMAC Minutes will be posted on the CRTPA website for public review.

ARTICLE VI: OFFICERS & DUTIES

Section 1. COMMITTEE LEADERSHIP AND SELECTION

The members of the CMAC shall elect from their own membership the following officers no later than the last meeting of the calendar year:

A: Chairperson

B: Vice-Chairperson

Officers shall be elected by a majority vote of the quorum present.

Section 2. LEADERSHIP TERMS

The terms of office for all officers shall be one year beginning at the first regular CMAC meeting of the calendar year and terminating at the last regular CMAC meeting of the year, or until their successors are elected at the next regular meeting of the committee. Any officer may be re-elected for the same office.

Section 3. LEADERSHIP DUTIES:

The Chairperson shall preside at all meetings of the CMAC and conduct all meetings of the CMAC. In the event of the Chairperson's absence, or at the Chairperson's direction, the Vice-Chairperson shall assume the powers and duties of the Chairperson. In the absence of both a Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson at a regular or special CMAC meeting, a temporary Chair shall be elected by majority vote at the meeting to serve as Chairperson of that meeting, for that meeting alone.

ARTICLE VII: RULES OF PROCEDURE

Section 1. MEETING CONDUCT

All meetings of the CMAC shall be conducted in accordance with the most current edition of Roberts Rules of Order Revised. The Chairperson (or the Vice Chairperson when serving as Chairperson) shall preside at all meetings and shall either serve as the "parliamentarian" or designate another CMAC member to serve as "parliamentarian".

Section 2. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Whenever a CMAC Member has cause to believe that a matter to be discussed would involve him/her to be in a conflict of interest, he/she shall announce the conflict of interest and refrain from voting on any such matter.

ARTICLE VIII: BYLAW AMENDMENTS

Section 1. AMENDMENT BY CMAC

These bylaws may be amended by a majority of the quorum present at any regular meeting of the CMAC. All such amendments shall be subject to approval by the CRTPA Board.

Section 2. AMENDMENT BY CRTPA

These bylaws may be amended by the CRTPA Board.

Section 3. NOTICING OF AMENDMENTS

Notice of any proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to all members of the CMAC not less than thirty (30) days prior to the meeting at which such amendments are to be considered.

ARTICLE IX: CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

Section 1. INDIVIDUAL CITIZEN COMMENTS

Citizen comment will be accepted at the beginning of meetings, after a motion on an item has been seconded (but prior to a vote), and at the end of meetings. Citizens shall follow the guidelines below to speak at CMAC Meetings.

- a. Citizens may speak on issues related to the approved agenda or any issue for which the CRTPA has the statutory authority to act upon.
- b. Citizens must complete a separate "Request to Speak" card for each item they wish to address. If the citizen is unable to complete the card, he/she will be assisted by the CRTPA staff.
- c. Citizens will be allowed to speak up to three minutes on each topic they have indicated on a "Request to Speak" card. Additional time may be allotted at the discretion of the Chairperson.
- d. Large groups of citizens wishing to speak are encouraged to designate a spokesperson to represent their views. Additional time may be allotted at the discretion of the CMAC when such a situation arises.

Section 2. CITIZEN GROUP COMMENTS

Large groups of citizens wishing to speak are encouraged to designate a spokesperson to represent their views. Items a, b, and c, above, under Section 1. Individual Citizen Comments, applies to Citizen Group Comments.

THOMASVILLE ROAD PLANNING STUDY UPDATE

REQUESTED BY: FDOT

Type of Item: Information

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) consultant staff will provide an update on the Thomasville Road Planning Study.

HISTORY

The purpose of the Thomasville Road Planning Study is to study additional highway capacity alternatives to relieve current and anticipated congestion along the Thomasville Road/ Capital Circle Northeast State Road (S.R.) 61/U.S. 319) corridor, including the interchanges with S.R. 8/ Interstate-10 (I-10). The project limits extend from Metropolitan Boulevard to the Bannerman Road/ Bradfordville Road intersection. Alternatives being considered include adding travel lanes to S.R. 61 (U.S. 319) in the northbound and southbound directions, improving the existing roadway network around Thomasville Road, and constructing a new roadway on a new alignment. This project is needed to increase the capacity of the north/south connector for movement of people and goods from northeast Tallahassee and locations in Georgia to I-10 and locations south within the urban area of Tallahassee.

As reported at the March 2016 CRTPA Board meetings, the Thomasville Road Planning Study is exploring alternatives to facilitate north-south mobility within the proposed study limits. Coordination has been ongoing with Blueprint 2000, City of Tallahassee, Leon County and the Welaunee Development.

Efforts to date include significant coordination for the Methodology Letter of Understanding (MLOU) with the above mentioned parties and CRTPA staff to outline the methods of traffic analysis that are being used for this study. This document indicates agreement with all signed parties as to the methods utilized, and in turn the results, of the traffic analysis.

Since the March CRTPA Meeting update, FDOT's consultant for this project (RS&H) has completed the 2040 Build Alternative Analyses as outlined in the MLOU. These alternatives include varying levels of improvements to Thomasville Road and Welaunee Boulevard to understand the effects of those improvements on the travel patterns within the roadway network. The existing network between those corridors has also been evaluated to identify potential constraints to mobility improvements. Analysis

ANALYSIS

A Level of Service (LOS) analysis was completed for the Thomasville Road Corridor. A detailed description of all alternatives analyzed is provided below:

"No-Build" Alternative: This is the "do nothing" alternative. Traffic forecasts were completed using the regional travel demand model socio-economic data (zData) projected for 2040, supported by the existing roadway network in the base year model (2007).

The traffic analysis showed that the No-Build Alternative did not meet the adopted LOS for the Thomasville Road Corridor for the horizon year 2040. However, the No-Build Alternative will remain under consideration throughout the Thomasville Road Planning Study project and in a future Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study to serve as a benchmark to compare other alternatives.

Alternative 1: Build Welaunee and No-Build Thomasville

This alternative uses the approved CRTPA 2040 Cost Feasible Model as the basis for analysis. Based on coordination with Blueprint 2000 and others, two modifications to the network have been made:

- 1. Thornton Road was extended to connect at Welaunee Boulevard south of I-10.
- 2. Shamrock Road South was extended from Welaunee Boulevard to Miccosukee Road. This extension ties into the Miles Johnson Road intersection.

In addition to these network changes, minor adjustments were made to several centroid connectors in the area to correspond to these changes.

The results of the capacity analysis on Thomasville Road for this Build Alternative did not meet the adopted LOS.

Alternative 2: Build Welaunee and Build Thomasville (8-lane arterial 45mph)

This alternative includes all Alternative 1 improvements, plus the addition of one northbound and one southbound lane on Thomasville Road, creating an 8-lane arterial with 45 mph posted speed.

The results of the capacity analysis for this Build Alternative met the adopted LOS for the segments along Thomasville Road within the study area. However, additional improvements will need to be investigated in a future PD&E Study to meet the adopted LOS at several of the intersections along the Thomasville Road corridor.

Alternative 3: Super-Build Welaunee and No-Build Thomasville

This alternative includes all Alternative 1 improvements, plus capacity improvements to the Welaunee Boulevard corridor. The "Super Build Welaunee" alternative includes Welaunee Boulevard as a 6-lane divided arterial from Fleischmann Road to the Shamrock Street Extension, a 4-lane divided arterial from the Shamrock Street Extension to Centerville Road, and the existing 2-lane roadway on Bradfordville Road from Centerville Road to Thomasville Road. It was not shown as an expressway, based on coordination with Blueprint 2000 and representatives from the Welaunee Development. The proposed access management on Welaunee Boulevard includes potential access points approximately at ¼ mile intervals.

The results of the capacity analysis on Thomasville Road for this Build Alternative did not meet the adopted LOS for the segments along Thomasville Road within the study area.

Additional analysis was completed on Alternative 3, which provided a 6-lane divided arterial from Fleischmann Road to Centerville Road, and a 4-lane divided arterial along Bradfordville Road to Thomasville Road. Regardless of the level of improvements to Welaunee Boulevard, the results of the capacity analysis on Thomasville Road did not meet the adopted LOS for the segments along Thomasville Road within the study area.

Alternative 4: No-Build Welaunee and Build Thomasville (8-lane arterial 45mph)

This alternative tests the scenario where a limited network is provided to support the Welaunee development. Alternative 4 includes all of the projected 2040 development (residential and non-residential) both north and south of I-10; however, the network includes Welaunee Boulevard only to the Thornton Road extension. There was no overpass of or interchange with I-10, and no major roadway network north of I-10. All development connections north of I-10 were made to Miccosukee Road or Centerville Road. This alternative included the addition of one northbound and one southbound lane on Thomasville Road, creating an 8-lane arterial with 45 mph posted speed.

The results of the capacity analysis on Thomasville Road for this Build Alternative met the adopted LOS for the segments along Thomasville Road. However, additional intersection improvements will need to be investigated in a future PD&E Study to meet the adopted LOS at several of the intersections along the Thomasville Road corridor.

Alternative 5: Killearn Corridor

Once the four Build Alternatives outlined in the MLOU were analyzed, it was realized that Thomasville Road needed to be widened to 8 lanes between Kerry Forest Parkway and Killarney Way to address capacity needs in the year 2040, regardless of the level of improvement to the Welaunee Boulevard corridor (up to the maximum of a 6-lane divided arterial). A fifth Build Alternative was tested based on suggestions to widen Olson Road, which creates a parallel north/south connector to Thomasville Road. In order to provide sufficient relief to north/south congestion, roadway segments north of Olson Road were identified to provide an alternative north/south route parallel to Thomasville Road.

The Killearn Corridor is located within the Existing Network Improvements Area, which has been shown in previous project updates, but without a defined corridor for improvement. The Killearn Corridor begins on Fleischmann Road at the intersection with Welaunee Boulevard. The corridor continues north on Fleischmann Road to Olson Road. It follows Olson Road to Raymond Diehl Road, then heads northeast on Raymond Diehl Road to Killarney Way. The corridor follows Killarney Way east to Shamrock Street West and continues north on along Shamrock Street West to West Shannon Lakes. Continuing north on West Shannon Lakes to Kerry Forest Parkway, then north on Velda Dairy Road and making a connection to Thomasville Road via Bradfordville Road. This corridor was analyzed to determine the degree of congestion relief on Thomasville Road when improvements to the existing north/ south connections were completed.

Due to the close proximity to Thomasville Road, the north/south alignment of the improved roadways, and the density of residential development in the area, the 4-lane Killearn Corridor provided significant improvement to traffic congestion on Thomasville Road. In addition, the Killearn Corridor improvements may provide enough congestion relief such that at-grade improvements

throughout the Thomasville Road and I-10 interchange area of influence (AOI) may be sufficient, potentially negating the need for additional grade separation at the interchange, or 'flyover'. Further study is recommended to analyze the improvements to the Killearn Corridor and at-grade improvements to the AOI to determine the impacts of those improvements to the natural and built environment.

The results of the capacity analysis on Thomasville Road for this Build Alternative met the adopted LOS for the segments along Thomasville Road. However, additional intersection improvements will need to be investigated in a future PD&E Study to meet the adopted LOS at several of the intersections along the Thomasville Road corridor.

Intersection Improvements

As discussed in the Build Alternatives sections above, several intersections will require additional improvements to meet the adopted LOS, based on overall delay experienced at the intersections. There are several innovative intersection improvements that could be considered during follow-up studies to best fit the individual intersections, including grade separated and at-grade options.

Transit Option

Several inquiries have been made regarding investigation of a transit option. A very preliminary analysis was conducted to determine the potential unserved demand of the Thomasville Road Corridor that could be served through transit, or other modes of travel. These calculations were based on the 2040 Cost Feasible travel demand model. Further analysis would be required in a follow-up study to determine the level of local support and potential feasibility of additional transit improvements.

Environmental Analysis

A basic environmental analysis was also completed as part of this study for each of the three areas being evaluated for potential improvement. Environmental considerations such as contamination, geotechnical features, wetlands, threatened and endangered species habitat, floodplains, as well as historic and archaeological sites have been identified as part of an overall constraints map.

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

Much of the public involvement for this project was conducted through the CRTPA Board and Committees with several presentations and updates over the course of the project. In addition, two large home owners associations near the project area, Killearn Estates and Killearn Lakes, were contacted twice during the project. The first presentation to both HOAs in 2015 was intended to introduce the project, and the second presentation during this month of 2016 was to present the Planning Study findings and gather feedback.

A project website was also developed to engage stakeholders and other interested parties. It provides additional information regarding the project as well as a comment page to submit comments or questions to FDOT staff. The website is available on http://www.nwflroads.com, then clicking on Future Projects and scrolling down to Leon County.

Comments received through May 23, 2016, will be included in the Final Planning Study Report.

NEXT STEP

The FDOT remains committed to keeping CRTPA updated on developments of this project through updates to staff, committees and the Board at milestones along the way.

Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency Findings, Recommendations and Noteworthy Practices

The Florida Department of Transportation (Department) District Three has conducted, for 2016, a "Modified" State Certification review of the CRTPA. In the 2015 Certification letter, the Department encouraged the CRTPA staff to remain diligent in their efforts to consistently submit invoices and status reports on a monthly basis. The CRTPA continues to make a concerted effort to submit timely monthly invoices and status reports and this is duly recognized. Please note that the final invoices and progress reports for [State] Fiscal Year 2016, ending June 30th, need to be submitted to the Department within **60** days.

The CRTPA is commended for their active involvement in regional transportation planning demonstrated by ongoing coordination with local governments as well as with the Department, the Apalachee Regional Planning Council, the Office of Greenways and Trails, and Blueprint 2000. These partnerships result in the successful implementation of trail, enhancement, safety and capacity projects throughout the region. The use of the State Infrastructure Bank to accelerate project delivery and reduce project costs is notable. These noteworthy practices exemplify the CRTPA's commitment to an inclusive transportation planning process promoting regional approaches and multi-modal solutions to the area's transportation needs.

This report assesses the written and verbal answers to the Certification questions presented to the CRTPA staff. Department staff determine the specific areas for which certain questions were asked based on information from the previous modified certification, observation of and coordination with the CRTPA, and attendance at CRTPA Board and committee meetings. There are no corrective actions identified and the Department staff recommends the CRTPA continue their diligence with invoicing and reporting.

One of the tasks in the Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan (RMP) included the incorporation of projects from the CRTPA's Congestion Management Plan (CMP). These projects are based on existing data and safety issues identified in the current year. The CMP was intentionally updated prior to the RMP to ensure these efforts were coordinated and could potentially resolve multiple transportation system issues.

The relief of congestion and improvement of "safety" also played a role in the RMP's criteria for roadway, bike, and pedestrian projects. This would ensure that congestion and safety projects would receive proper points to move forward with in terms of high rankings for project consideration in the Cost Feasible Plan.

This effort minimized the initiation of new projects in the first (2016 – 2020) and second tier (2021 – 2025) of the RMP and placed newer projects in Tier 3 to allow for these project to be developed and moved on as the current Transportation Improvement Plan projects came to fruition.

Additionally, the CRTPA worked with Blueprint 2000 staff to ensure that any project that being initiated on the state and federal road system were defined as to priority and phase by tier. The CRTPA staff and Blueprint 2000 staff recognized that there are a lot of capital intensive projects that are currently or will be ready for completion in the next 5 to 10 years and that there needs to be a close associated to move these projects forward and not waste time, effort or funding opportunities.

The CRTPA's Mobility Coordinator/Public Information Officer/Title VI Coordinator, Lynn Barr, attended multiple training events related to Title VI, civil rights, and vulnerable communities in 2015. Lynn worked with agency partners as an actor in two separate poverty simulations to show how vulnerable the Title VI populations are in terms of time for public involvement when their resources of time and money are scarce and must be reserved for necessities of life. These simulation experiences took place in January and February of 2015 at FHWA and FAMU (a Minority Institute of Higher Education) respectively. In August of 2015, Lynn attended the Southern Transportation Civil Rights Training Symposium "Waves of Opportunity, Drivers of Change" in Ft. This item provides information to the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) on the activities of the Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee (CMAC), the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), and the Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Boards (TDCBs) for Leon, Wakulla, Jefferson, and Gadsden counties.

TAC and CMAC: At the time of agenda preparation, the May Meeting for the CMAC and TAC had not occurred. The actions of the joint CMAC/TAC Meeting, which takes place on Tuesday, May 10, 2016, will be provided under separate cover for the Board Members prior to or at the CRTPA Board Meeting.

TDCB: The actions of the Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Boards (TDCB's) in Gadsden, Jefferson, Leon and Wakulla counties are listed below.

Wakulla County

The Wakulla TDCB met on April 8, 2016. At that meeting the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged voted unanimously to contract with the Wakulla Senior Services Center to continue their role as the Community Transportation Coordinator through June 30, 2021. The next meeting of the Wakulla TDCB will include the Annual Public Hearing and will take place on June 14, 2016.

Jefferson and Gadsden County

The Jefferson County TDCB and the Gadsden County TDCB have not met since the last CRTPA Meeting. Both Boards will meet on June 16, 2016, at which time the Annual Public Hearings for each Board will be held.

Leon County

The Leon County TDCB has not met since the last CRTPA meeting. Their next meeting is scheduled for July 20, 2016.
