- The CRTPA Transportation Alternatives Program coordinates region's solicitation, submittal and ranking of applications seeking federal Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside funding
- Projects are solicited every 2 years
- Approximately \$300,000 in dedicated to the CRTPA area annually in TA funding
- Program funded with a set-aside of funds under the Surface
 Transportation Block Grant Program as identified in the Fixing America's
 Surface Transportation (FAST) Act





CRTPA TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM (TAP) What projects have received funding?

- Havana Middle School Sidewalks (Limits: 11th Avenue (4th Street to Iron Bridge Road); Iron Bridge Road (CR 12A to 11th Avenue); design funded in FY 18 (Gadsden County)
- <u>US 98/Panacea Community Sidewalk</u> (Limits: Mound Street to US Post Office); design and construction funded (Wakulla County)
- Adams Street (CR 268) (City of Quincy) Sidewalk Construction (Limits: Clarke Street to MLK Jr Blvd); construction funded in FY 18 (Gadsden County)
- Glenview Drive Sidewalk Project (Limits: Thomasville Road to Meridian Road); construction funded in FY 21 (Leon County)
- •Mamie Scott Drive (Limits: Mississippi St to Texas Hill Rd); construction funded in FY 16 (Jefferson County)
- Capital Cascades Bridge received \$850,000 in FY 14 (Leon County)





Project Eligibility

- Construction, Planning, and Design of on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other non-motorized forms of transportation including sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic calming techniques, lighting and other safety-related infrastructure, and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990
- Construction, planning, and design of infrastructure-related projects and systems that will **provide safe routes for non-drivers**, including children, older adults, and individuals with disabilities to access daily needs
- Conversion and use of abandoned railroad corridors for trails for pedestrians, bicyclists, or other non-motorized transportation users
- Construction of turnouts, overlooks, and viewing areas
- Community improvement activities, including:
 - Inventory, control, or removal of outdoor advertising;
 - Historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities;
 - Vegetation management practices in transportation rights-of-way to improve roadway safety, prevent against invasive species, and provide erosion control; and
 - Archaeological activities relating to impacts from implementation of a transportation project eligible under 23 USC.



Project Eligibility (continued)

- Any environmental mitigation activity, including pollution prevention and pollution abatement activities and mitigation to:
 - Address storm water management, control, and water pollution prevention or abatement related to highway construction or due to highway runoff including activities described in 23 USC 133(b)(3) [as amended under the FAST Act], and 328(a) and 329 of Title 23; or,
 - Reduce vehicle-caused wildlife mortality or to restore and maintain connectivity among terrestrial or aquatic habitats.

- Planning, designing, or constructing boulevards and other roadways largely in the rightof-way of former Interstate System routes or other divided highways.



Eligible Sponsors

- local governments
- regional transportation authorities
- transit agencies
- natural resource or public land agencies
- school districts, local education agencies, or schools
- tribal governments
- any other local or regional governmental entity with responsibility for or oversight of transportation or recreational trails (other than a MPO or a State agency) that the State determines to be eligible



TAP Process

- Submit an application (www.crtpa.org). Required items include:
 - a resolution of support from the project sponsor
 - proof of right-of-way ownership of proposed project (only applications that identify that the proposed project is located within public ownership will be considered). Such proof includes the provision of

plats, deeds, prescriptions and certified surveys.

SAMPLE RESOLUTION NO. 2017-000

A RESOLUTION BY THE City Commission, City of Ryun, FL, TO SUPPORT CONSTRUCTION OF Millie Molic Mai Sidewalls WITH TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES (TA) SET-ASIDE SURFACE TRANSPORTATION BLOCK GRANT (STBG) FUNDING; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, walking helps meet the goals of Chapter 339.175 Florida Statutes, to serve the mobility needs of people while minimizing transportation related fuel consumption and air pollution; and

WHEREAS, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) encourages people to walk for fitness transportation and fun; and

WHEREAS, President Obama signed the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act (Pub. 1. No. 114-04) into law on December 4, 2015, replacing the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) with Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program funding for Transportation Alternatives (TAP) set-Aside funds. These include all projects and activities that were previously eligible under TAP, and addresses growing concerns about air quality, open space, and traffic connection: and

WHEREAS, The Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside STBG Program strengthens the cultural, aesthetic, and environmental aspects of the Nation's intermodal transportation system; and

WHEREAS, this support is consistent with the Hampton Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Florida Department of Transportation, CDC, and FAST Act policies supporting alternative means of transportation; and

WI IEREAS, the proposed sidewalk on Mia Street, Mollie Avenue, and Millie Street will provide the neighborhoods on the north side of SR 710 (Commerce Avenue) a safe means of pedestrian access to Shelby Elementary School, Lexie Sports Park, shopping center, church, and businesses.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE City Commission, City of Ryan, FL THAT:

- The City Commission supports the construction of the Millis Mollis Mas Sidewalk Project and authorizes the City to submit an application to the Florida Department of Transportation in 2012 to be considered for Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside Surface Transportation Block Grant (STRIG) Program funding; and
- Expresses a willingness to enter into a Memorandum of Agreement between the City of Ryan. Florida and the Florida Department of Transportation if said funding is awarded.

CRTPA TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM (TAP) 2016 ADOPTED EVALUATION CRITERIA

(1) SAFETY

Describe how the project will improve public safety for all transportation users (Examples include reducing hazards for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists) (Maximum Points = 20) (<u>OPERATIONALIZE</u>: Maximum points to those applications which provide supporting documentation including crash data, documentation of unsafe activity. Does the project propose the addition of a crosswalk, sidewalk, bike lanes, traffic calming?)

(2) CONNECTIVITY

Describe how the project facilitates or improves multimodal transportation linkages (To what extent does the project facilitate access to the daily needs of the region's residents such as school, work, shopping, transit and parks? Maximize use of existing network? [Maximum Points = 20] (OPERATIONALIZE: Project connects to existing transportation facilities; project maximizes use of existing facilities.)

2) ACCESSIBILITY

Describe how the project contributes to enhanced mobility options for the transportation

disadvantaged including disabled, elderly, low income and minority populations (Moximum Points = 20) (<u>OPERATIONALIZE</u>: Does the project address needs of the elderly and disabled populations that go beyond ADA requirements? Is project in proximity to affordable housing? Will the project improve low income resident access to transit, regional jobs, local essential services and educational opportunities? Maximum points to those projects which enhance mobility options as identified above).

- Project Does Not Address a Non-Motorized Need
- Project Mostly Benefits an Isolated Group
- No Documentation of Public or Private Support
- No Documentation of Local Planning Consistency
- Ownership Issues
