10th Annual Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency Transportation Disadvantaged Program Driver of the Year

• Robert Riley of Big Bend Transit of Leon County. In the past twelve months, Mr. Cooper drove over 2460 hours with no accidents or incidents. He received three commendations.

10th Annual Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency Edward B. "Ted" Waters Safety Award.

■ **Big Bend Transit of Jefferson County.** This is the fifth year that Big Bend Transit of Jefferson County has won the Safety Award. In the past twelve months, 9 drivers and vehicles have provided **14,851** trips, driven **218,656** miles, with no accidents, injuries, or incidents. Ms. Willie Anne Dickey, manager of the Jefferson County operation, will accept the award. In the past five years, Big Bend Transit of Jefferson County has driven **1,315,801** miles without accident or incident.

This award was renamed in honor and memory of Edward B. "Ted" Waters, founder of Big Bend Transit. Mr. Waters passed away on September 5, 2012 after 33 years of service to the Big Bend region. Mr. Waters was active in the development of the Transportation Disadvantaged Program, and active in youth athletics for decades.

1. Agenda Modifications

Board Action: Commissioner Barfield made a motion to modify the agenda and requested item 2B and 2C be pulled from consent agenda for discussion. Commissioner Desloge seconded the motion for the modification. The motion was unanimously passed.

2 Consent Agenda

A. Minutes of the May 19, 2014 CRTPA Board Meeting

Board Action: Commissioner Desloge made a motion to approve the consent agenda with the modifications. Commissioner Barfield seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

3. Consent Items Pulled for Discussion

A. CRTPA Public Involvement Process Plan (PIPP) Adoption

Commissioner Barfield stated that public meetings are not scheduled to be held in Jefferson County.

Board Action: She made the motion to include meetings in Jefferson County, as it is a part of the CRTPA region. Commissioner Proctor seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

B. CRTPA Region Federal Functional Classification Maps

Commissioner Barfield questioned the change of the classifications of the roadway of Highway 90 be changed to a rural major collector. She noted that Veteran's Memorial Drive was being changes from a minor to a major collector. She expressed concerns for funding and the connection between Leon and Jefferson County. Commissioner Barfield stated she sought clarification on the change and expressed concerns for funding in the future.

Board Action: Commissioner Barfield made a motion to approve the CRTPA Region Federal Functional Classification Maps. Commissioner Dozier seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

4. Roll Call Vote Agenda Items

A. Fiscal Year (FY) 2015 - FY 2019 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Adoption

The CRTPA FY 2015 – FY 2019 TIP has been developed for Board adoption. The TIP contains those projects that have received funding in the Florida Department of Transportation's FY 2015 – FY 2019 Work Program.

Dr. Howard Kessler, spoke of the realignment of Highways US 98/319. He stated this location is the entrance to the local high school. He expressed concerns related to safety of the students attending the high school as well as impacts on the community. He noted this realignment may not reduce negative impacts as it is intended.

Dana Peck 2481 Surf Road, Wakulla County, requested the 7.8 million in funds for the US 319 (US 98 to north of Alaska Way) project be removed from the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). She stated this is dangerous to have this type of capacity on the roadway at a high school entrance. She stated that no one knew of this plan, but once it was publicly known, the public has become outraged. She also noted this item was not brought before the Wakulla County Commission. She stated for these reasons, this project should not be funded and removed from the TIP.

The Board discussed the process for the TIP and adoption of the document. Commissioner Merritt stated he does not feel the funding should be removed, but felt that the current design concept will not address safety concerns of the students or the community. He stated he has presented the FDOT with a concept that would/should be better for this location. Bryant Paulk, FDOT, provided some

back ground on this project. He stated this corridor of US 98 that travels through Leon and Wakulla counties, has been a priority for citizens of both counties for many years. This project has had a full PD&E Study completed and design was almost completed. He noted the FDOT proposed a four laning of this highway and the citizens agreed with it. The intersection improvements are interim improvements and in leiu of four laning, which cannot be completed at this time. The DOT secretary was able to capture funds from other projects and areas within the state (outside of District 3) with the intention of advancing this project. The Secretary then made the decision to move forward with the most southern portion of the project. He noted the Department would continue to review this project and if there were citizen concern and comments, those should be sent to the Department and would be considered. Commissioner Proctor stated we should send a letter of support of Wakulla County in regards to this project.

Board Action: Commissioner Dailey made a motion to approve the Fiscal Year (FY) 2015 – FY 2019 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Adoption. Commissioner Dozier seconded. A roll call vote was taken and the motion was unanimously passed.

Board Action: Commissioner Dailey made a motion to draft a letter of support aligning with citizens and request that other alternatives be researched. Commissioner Proctor seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

5. CRTPA Discussion

A. Tallahassee-Leon County Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Study

The Tallahassee-Leon County Safe Routes to School Study identifies opportunities to implement SRTS policies, programs and projects to support Leon County schools. The study has been completed for CRTPA Board approval.

Commissioner Miller expressed concerns with the delay of providing comments to the consultants and staff regarding the study (from City of Tallahassee). Commissioner Dailey noted the document should reflect the recommendation of the Gilchrist Elementary School Advisory Committee that was formally approved by the School's School Advisory Committee as well as a formally approved by the Leon County Advisory Committee as well as the Leon County Advisory committee. Mr. Reed stated the document would be revised and brought back before the board for approval in September.

Board Action: Commissioner Proctor made a motion to approve option 1 to postpone item until September meeting. Commissioner Madison seconded the motion. The motion was withdrawn.

Board Action: Commissioner Desloge made a motion to approve and not postpone the study with noted modifications. Commissioner Miller seconded the motion. The motion was withdrawn.

Board Action: Commissioner Desloge made the motion to approve option 1 to postpone the item until September, to allow for additional comments from the City of Tallahassee, as well as the comments provided by Commissioner Dailey. Commissioner Dailey seconded the motion. The motion was passed with Commissioner Miller voting in opposition.

B. 2013 CRTPA Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR)

The 2013 CRTPA Comprehensive Annual Financial Report has been developed for CRTPA adoption.

Board Action: Commissioner Maddox made a motion to accept the 2013 CRTPA Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) as presented. Commissioner Madison seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

C. CRTPA Bylaws

An update to the CRTPA Bylaws has been developed for Board approval.

Mr. Reed briefly outlined the changes to the bylaws. Citing an Executive Committee regarding the Annual Evaluation of the Executive Director as well as items that are time-sensitive items, if necessary. The current recommendation from staff was the committee would consist of the Chair, Vice-chair and the most immediate past chair. The second change is regarding the Legal Services Agreement relating to a term of 36 months/3 years contract for legal services.

Board Action: Commissioner Croley made a motion to accept the Draft CRTPA Bylaws as presented by staff including the recommendations from the board. Commissioner Madison seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

D. Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan (RMP) Public Involvement Process Plan

The public involvement process plan has been developed for the Connections 2040 RMP and the Project Team will be presenting this to the CRTPA for approval. Additionally, the team will be presenting results from the first round of public meetings held in May.

Board Action: Commissioner Dozier made a motion to accept the Connections 2040 Regional Mobility Plan (RMP) Public Involvement Process Plan. Commissioner Madison seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously passed.

CRTPA GENERAL PLANNING CONSULTANT CONTRACT EXTENSION

REQUESTED BY: CRTPA Staff

Type of Item: Consent

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

In October of 2011, the CRTPA Executive Director executed three separate contracts with three General Planning Consultants (GPC) to perform work as needed for the CRTPA Board. These contracts had a three-year lifespan with a possible two-year extension in one-year increments, or a single two-year extension. Since these contracts are going to expire in October, CRTPA staff is seeking approval of one-year extensions for all three GPC's.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Approve the extension of the CRTPA GPC Contracts for Renaissance Planning Group, Reynolds, Smith and Hills, and URS Corporation Southern to October 2015.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

The CRTPA General Planning Consultant process began in was initiated in 2011 with consultants selected in June and work orders provided in September of 2011, respectively. The three firms that currently serve as CRTPA's GPC include:

- Renaissance Planning Group (RPG)
- Reynolds, Smith and Hills (RSH), and
- URS Corporation Southern (URS)

The projects that the GPC have provided services for include:

Renaissance Planning Group

Development of the Capital City to the Sea Trails Scope-of-Services CRTPA Retreat Facilitation Jefferson County Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan Leon County Safe Routes to School Plan

Reynolds Smith and Hills

CRTPA Retreat Facilitation CRTPA Model Update Monroe Street Median Feasibility Study

URS Corporation Southern

6th Avenue Sidewalk Feasibility Study CRTPA Congestion Management Plan Update CRTPA Webpage Consultation CRTPA Webpage Development

The initial contract with the GPC firms was for a three-year term and included options to extend the contracts for two years utilizing either a single two-year extension or two one-year extensions.

These contracts are scheduled to terminate in October 2014. Therefore, CRTPA staff is seeking approval to extend the GPC contracts for one year with another extension potentially being sought in September of 2015.

CRTPA FISCAL YEAR 2015 OPERATING BUDGET

REQUESTED BY: CRTPA Staff

Type of Item: Discussion/Action

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

As required by financial and audit standards, the Fiscal Year 2015 Operating Budget has been developed for CRTPA Board adoption.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Option 1: Adopt by resolution the Fiscal Year 2015 Operating Budget.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

The budget of the CRTPA is based on the tasks and revenues detailed in the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), which covers staff operations in a fiscal year from July 1 to June 30. The host government for the CRTPA, the City of Tallahassee, operates on a fiscal year that begins on October 1 and ends on September 30.

There is a three-month gap that always occurs between the end of the CRTPA UPWP funding year and the end of the City fiscal year. This was duly noted in the CRTPA 2005 Financial Statement Audit dated March 1, 2006, and adopted by the CRTPA on March 27, 2006. Adoption of this resolution satisfies the intent of the management letter comment, as it has in previous years.

Budget Issues

The proposed FY 2015 Operating Budget reflects the expenses anticipated to occur when completing the tasks adopted in the Unified Planning Work Program. Details of contents of budget items are provided below:

- Total Personnel Expenses include salaries, mandated employer costs for Social Security, Medicaid and health benefits.
- Operating costs include the cost of using services provided by the host government, the
 City of Tallahassee. This includes using human resources, accounting, purchasing, and
 information systems services. These costs are calculated by the city through a Full Cost
 Allocation Plan and charged to the CRTPA. It reflects various factors related to
 CRTPA's utilization of services contracted by CRTPA through Staff Services agreement
 with the City of Tallahassee executed on May 21, 2012.

Unclassified Contractual Services are for the cost of outside legal counsel, audit services
WCOT broadcast services, insurance and retreat facilitators, when needed. General
liability and workman's compensation have now been added to this budget line item.
This insurance is necessary since CRTPA is no longer included as part of the City of
Tallahassee's risk management pool.

The revenue from grant reimbursements is expected to cover the expenses, with the exception of the local matching funds required for the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5305D grant and expenses not allowed under the grants. In the event that reimbursements do not fully cover the remainder of the costs, the difference will be prorated among member governments in accordance with the adopted CRTPA bylaws.

Significant Changes from the FY 14 Budget

Adjustments have been made in the FY 15 budget in the following line items:

- Salaries increased to reflect a 2.0% salary increase for all personnel. This is in line with Leon County but less than the City of Tallahassee. The recommended increase would be effective on October 1.
- Health benefit and Pension costs increased by 5% and 7% respectively.
- Unclassified Contractual Services have increased by \$8000. To compensate for the increase (\$12,000) due to insurance, legal services were reduced by \$4000. In past years, legal service for the most part have not exceed \$40,000 per year.
- Costs for Allocated Accounts increased slightly overall from FY14. The Staff will continue to work with the City on stabilizing the City's Cost Allocation Plan costs from year to year.

The budget adjustments for FY 15 resulted in a net increase over the FY 14 budget of 2.9% (\$22,461). The increased costs will be covered by the grant funding CRTPA is allocated each year by the State and Federal governments. Details of the budget and adjustments are included in *Attachment 2*.

Type of Item: Discussion/Action

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

Staff is seeking approval of the FY 2016 – FY 2020 Regional Mobility Plan (RMP) Priority Project List (PPL) (included as *Attachment I*). Containing multimodal projects identified in the agency's adopted Long Range Transportation Plan ("The Regional Mobility Plan"), the RMP PPL is one of the priority project lists annually adopted by the CRTPA to provide guidance to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) as it proceeds with development of the Annual State Work Program.

NOTE: Next year's RMP PPL (FY 2017 – FY 2021) will reflect the projects identified on the CRTPA's newly adopted "Connections RMP 2040 Update", scheduled for adoption in September 2015. As a result, the RMP PPL's list of projects will contain newly the identified and ranked projects reflected the updated RMP.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY CRTPA COMMITTEES

On September 2, 2014, the CRTPA's two (2) committees (Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee) recommended CRTPA <u>approval</u> of the FY 2016 - FY 2020 Regional Mobility Plan Priority Project List.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Adopt the FY 2016 - FY 2020 Regional Mobility Plan Priority Project List.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

Annually, the CRTPA adopts priority project lists (PPLs) that identify, in ranked order, the agency's transportation project priorities. These lists are submitted to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to provide guidance as the agency proceeds with development of the Annual State Work Program. Specifically, the FDOT seeks to match available state and federal funds with eligible transportation projects ranked highest by the CRTPA.

Projects that receive funding are included in the annual State Work Program, a five-year document identifying state and federally funded transportation projects. The funded state and federal projects in the CRTPA region are then incorporated into the CRTPA's annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

The CRTPA annually adopts the following PPLs:

Regional Mobility Plan (RMP) PPL- Identifies bicycle, pedestrian, roadway and transit projects (<u>Project source</u>: The Long Range Transportation Plan ("The Regional Mobility Plan")) Transportation Alternatives PPL – Identifies community-based projects that expand travel choices and enhance the transportation experience such as bicycle and pedestrian facilities, safe routes to school and scenic byways projects (<u>Project source</u>: eligible projects solicited by the CRTPA every two (2) years)

Transportation Systems Management (TSM) PPL – Identifies low cost (typically intersection) improvements to the existing transportation system that can be constructed in less than two years and have gone through a required FDOT process in order to be considered eligible for funding (<u>Project source</u>: Historically, FDOT provides a list of eligible projects)

Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) PPL – Identifies roadways on the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) (<u>Project source</u>: SIS facilities that have been identified for transportation improvement in the RMP)

Tallahassee Regional Airport PPL – Identifies Tallahassee Regional Airport project consistent with the adopted Airport Master Plan (<u>Project source</u>: projects identified by The Tallahassee Regional Airport and provided to the CRTPA for adoption)

StarMetro PPL – Identifies transit projects consistent with StarMetro's adopted Transit Development Plan (<u>Project source</u>: projects identified by StarMetro and provided to the CRTPA for adoption)

Regional Mobility Plan PPL

The Draft FY 2016 – FY 2020 Regional Mobility Plan PPL is comprised of the projects identified in the CRTPA's Regional Mobility Plan (adopted in November 2010). The RMP PPL provides an integrated listing of bicycle, pedestrian, roadway and transit projects. Additionally, the RMP PPL maintains the ranked order of the projects contained within adopted RMP. This order was generated by applying points to the identified projects based upon the RMP's adopted Goals and Objectives.

As noted above, the Draft RMP PPL reflects the agency's currently adopted long range transportation plan (The RMP). The RMP is currently being updated ("Connections RMP 2040 Update") and is

scheduled for adoption in September 2015. As a result, *next year*'s RMP PPL (FY 2017 – FY 2021) will include contain newly identified and ranked projects as identified in the RMP 2040 Update.

Changes from last year's (FY 2015 - FY 2019) RMP PPL

This year's RMP PPL updates last year's (FY 2015 – FY 2019) RMP PPL by removing those projects on the list that have received funding, been constructed or are not construction ready. Specifically, the following projects have been revised:

- Crawfordville Road Express Bus Service, Havana Express Bus Service, Monticello Express
 Bus Service projects have been removed from list due to lack of local government operating
 funds required to proceed with project implementation.
- 10th Avenue (Duval Street to Monroe in Tallahassee) shared use path project removed due to constructability/right-of-way issues.
- Clay Street (Alabama Street to Preston Street in Tallahassee) sidewalk project has been removed due to sidewalk being constructed.
- Coleman Street (Walcott Street to Lake Bradford Road) sidewalk project has been removed due to the presence of an existing sidewalk.
- Midway Park and Ride project has been removed. The need for the project appears premature
 at this time. The project's need will increase when the Gadsden Express's (which provides bus
 service between Quincy, Midway and Tallahassee) frequency is increased (currently not
 anticipated due to lack of funding).
- Crawfordville Road sidewalks (in Crawfordville) have been removed due to the Crawfordville
 Highway Conceptual Design and Environmental Reevaluation that is currently underway. The
 study, which incorporates the sidewalk's location, will determine the roadway's preferred
 alternative (and will incorporate sidewalks regardless of which alternative is selected).
- Magnolia Drive (Lafayette Street to north of Appalachee Parkway) Intersection Improvement
 project has been removed due to recent developments: (1) improvements made by Leon County
 at Lafayette/Magnolia, and (2) the CRTPA's recently request that the FDOT examine
 pedestrian safety issues at the Magnolia Drive/Apalachee Parkway intersection as a potential
 Transportation Systems Management project.

Consistent with the direction provided by the CRTPA Board for the last 5 years of PPL development, staff proposes to maintain the \$1 million minimum set-aside for bicycle and pedestrian projects as the agency's number one funded project prior to the FDOT seeking funding for the other projects on the PPL.

PUBLIC INPUT

Public meetings to present the CRTPA's Draft FY 2016 – 2020 Priority Project Lists to the public were held on August 27 & 28, 2014 throughout the CRTPA Region (Monticello, St. Marks, Tallahassee and Quincy). Information regarding the meeting was published in the region's newspapers, placed on the CRTPA's website (www.crtpa.org) and an e-mail message regarding the meeting was sent to the agency's transportation partners.

NEXT STEPS

Subsequent to adoption of the CRTPA FY 2016 – FY 2020 PPLs, the lists will be provided to the FDOT for use as the agency proceeds with development of the Draft FY 2016 – FY 2020Annual State Work Program.

The Draft Annual State Work Program is currently scheduled to be presented to the CRTPA Board by the FDOT at the January 2015 CRTPA meeting. Subsequent to release of the Draft State Work Program, CRTPA staff will initiate development of the CRTPA FY 2016 – FY 2020 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) incorporating those transportation projects in the CRTPA region that have received state and federal funding.

As a background, the TSM Subcommittee was formed in May 2013 to review the agency's TSM prioritization process including recommendations for ranking the TSM PPL (information related to the subcommittee was included in the May 20, 2013 CRTPA meeting agenda). The subcommittee was comprised of members from the CRTPA's two committees (Technical Advisory Committee and Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee) and the subcommittee met three times.

In order to be considered for funding by the FDOT, TSM projects must be included on the FDOT TSM Candidate List. Associated with the FDOT TSM Candidate List is a TSM project process developed by the FDOT. *Attachment 2* provides a description of this process and how TSM projects are placed on the FDOT Candidate TSM list.

The Draft FY 2016 – 2020 TSM Priority Project List contains eligible TSM projects in proposed priority order. Project information related to the following is provided for each project:

- Proposed Rank: Lists the proposed TSM PPL project ranking as recommended by the CRTPA TSM Subcommittee on June 25, 2013.
- <u>Safety Data</u>: Safety data associated with each candidate project's traffic study (where available) is provided.
- <u>Level of Service Information</u>: Information related to the project's roadway/intersection level of service is provided as contained within the completed traffic study from the FDOT (if applicable).
- <u>Mobility Impact</u>: Information related to *pedestrian demand* was identified for each TSM candidate project. Information regarding *sidewalk availability* was identified as well as information related to *availability of transit* at each TSM candidate project's location is also included.

Changes From Last Year's (FY 2015 - FY 2019) TSM PPL

The following change to this year's TSM PPL has occurred:

<u>Project Update</u>: Last year's number one (#1) ranked project (Crawfordville Road intersection improvements) has been updated. Specifically, the Crawfordville Road/Bloxham Cutoff intersection has been listed as number one due to the funding of improvements at Crawfordville Road/US 98 intersection.

PUBLIC INPUT

Public meetings to present the CRTPA's Draft FY 2016 – 2020 Priority Project Lists to the public were held on August 27 & 28, 2014 throughout the CRTPA Region (Monticello, St. Marks, Tallahassee and Quincy). Information regarding the meeting was published in the region's newspapers, placed on the CRTPA's website (www.crtpa.org) and an e-mail message regarding the meeting was sent to the agency's transportation partners.

NEXT STEPS

Subsequent to adoption of the CRTPA FY 2016 - FY 2020 PPLs, the lists will be provided to the FDOT for use as the agency proceeds with development of the Draft FY 2016 - FY 2020 Annual State Work Program.

The Draft Annual State Work Program is scheduled to be presented to the CRTPA Board by the FDOT at the January 2015 CRTPA meeting. Subsequent to release of the Draft State Work Program, CRTPA staff will initiate development of the CRTPA FY 2016 – FY 2020 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) incorporating those transportation projects in the CRTPA region that have received state and federal funding.

The Transportation Systems Management (TSM) Project Process:

- ☐ The TPO, a local government or a citizen requests that FDOT study an intersection (which must include at least one State roadway). The FDOT will then complete the study within 12 weeks (dependent on work load).
- ☐ If a study has already been performed, then that study can be submitted to the FDOT ("Signed and Sealed by a Profession Engineer registered in the Sate of Florida") for review and approval.
- Once complete, if the study indicates that an improvement is warranted and would require right-of-way purchase or is too costly (over \$200,000) to be a 'push button' (fast response type) or regular traffic operations project (goes through the normal bidding process), then the project is placed on the Candidate TSM Project List.
- In order to be selected as a TSM work program project, the project must have a completed concept (unless the project is to be developed under a JPA and/or the FDOT is providing money to another entity to construct the project). A concept identifies the improvements and the associated present day construction and right of way cost.
- Due to FDOT staff reductions, District 3's general consultant has been assigned responsibility for TSM concept report development and is limited to 4 or 5 per year across the district.
- Typically, the FDOT sends the CRTPA the Candidate TSM Project List (in no priority order) in July for review and requests that the CRTPA finalize the project priority list by September 1.
- ☐ In the past, FDOT D-3 Traffic Operations has been allocated \$2 million annually for TSM projects. This will increase to \$2.75 Million for FY 2010. Due to this limited funding, typically (depending on the complexity of the project) only the TPO's top TSM candidate project is funded annually. This \$2.75 million must cover 4 TPO areas in the district. And, if any funds remain, consider some of the smaller counties that are not covered by a TPO area if they have candidate TSM project needs.
- Development of a concept report for a project to move forward with production typically takes 6 months. Due to this timeline, the FDOT annually reviews the current TSM priority list in December and selects projected candidate projects to be funded in the next year's Work Program cycle. In the past 2 years, the FDOT D3 Traffic Operations office has solicited input from the TAC in this selection process. Typically, the next unfunded TSM project priority would move to number one upon funding of the number one TSM project. One reason for this is to provide consistency to the FDOT on what projects are important to the CRTPA as well as to ensure adequate time for the development of a completed concept prior to inclusion in the FDOT Annual Work Program. However, this does not pre-empt other candidate projects from being added to the list as they are identified. Safety issues or critical need related to these new projects may override the typical process for the next unfunded candidate project to move up to number one and is certainly understood by FDOT.

Note: The Traffic Operations office aggressively seeks opportunities to include any candidate project improvements in larger Work Program projects or the Strategic Highway Safety Plan projects. Every 6 months, the Work Program of projects is reviewed to see if any new projects encompassing the candidate TSM project area has been funded. In addition, opportunities to implement improvements through developers are also aggressively pursued. This helps stretch the available TSM funding and maximizes its potential to fund TSM projects.

FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2016 – FY 2020 TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES (TA) PRIORITY PROJECT LIST (PPL)

REQUESTED BY: CRTPA Staff

Type of Item: Discussion/Action

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

Staff is seeking CRTPA approval of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2016 – FY 2020 Transportation Alternatives (TA) Priority Project List (*Attachment 1*). The TA PPL identifies projects that expand travel choices including on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other nonmotorized forms of transportation, recreational trail programs, safe routes to school projects as well as projects that seek to construct boulevards on certain types of eligible roadways. Projects on the CRTPA TA PPL were solicited throughout the CRTPA region by the CRTPA.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY CRTPA COMMITTEES

On September 2, 2014, the CRTPA's two (2) committees (Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee) recommended CRTPA <u>approval</u> of the FY 2016- FY 2020 Transportation Alternatives Priority Project List.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Adopt the FY 2016 – FY 2020 Transportation Alternatives Priority Project List.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

Transportation Alternatives are programs and projects, including on- and off-road pedestrian and bicycle facilities, infrastructure projects for improving non-driver access to public transportation and enhanced mobility, community improvement activities, and environmental mitigation; recreational trail program projects; safe routes to school projects; and projects for the planning, design or construction of boulevards and other roadways largely in the right-of-way of former Interstate System routes or other divided highways.

The creation of the Transportation Alternatives Program is related to the July 6, 2012 signing of P.L. 112-141, the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) by President Obama. Associated with MAP-21 was the establishment of the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) providing funding for programs and projects defined as transportation alternatives.

The Transportation Alternatives Program combined several existing (and separately funded) federal programs into one program. The formerly separate programs consolidated into the TAP are the Transportation Enhancements, Safe Routes to School and Scenic Byways Program. In light of this change, many of the projects formerly funded solely under the CRTPA's Transportation Enhancements program now compete for funds with other types of projects consolidated into the TAP (*Attachment 2* provides further details on the TAP).

CRTPA TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM

As a result of the above changes associated with MAP-21, the CRTPA's Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) was established in 2013 to replace the agency's former Transportation Enhancements (TE) program. Specifically, at the March 25, 2013 CRTPA Board meeting, members approved establishment of the CRTPA's TAP and an associated schedule for program implementation.

One of the first tasks involved the creation of the CRTPA TA Subcommittee. The subcommittee, comprised of 6 members (3 from the CRTPA's Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee (CMAC) and 3 from the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)), was tasked with (1) identifying evaluation criteria to rank the TA applications and, (2), reconvening in the spring of 2014 to score the CRTPA's TA applications using the approved evaluation criteria.

On November 18, 2013 the CRTPA approved the evaluation criteria developed by the subcommittee to use in ranking the TA applications. Specifically, the following criteria were approved:

In January 2014, a call for TA applications was formally made by the CRTPA and a total of ten (10) TA applications were received for TA funding consideration, as follows:

Subsequent to the applicant interview meetings, the TA Subcommittee met again on June 13, 2014 to formally rank/score the applications using the adopted criteria. Based upon this review, the following provides the recommended Draft FY 2016 – FY 2020 Transportation Alternatives Priority Project List in the subcommittee's ranked order:

TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM

ELIGIBLE TA FUNDING ACTIVITIES

The following activities are eligible for the receipt of federal TA funds pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 213(b) (source: FHWA website: http://www.fhwa.dot.gov/map21/guidance/guidetap.cfm):

- 1. <u>Transportation Alternatives</u> as defined in 23 U.S.C. 101(a)(29) (MAP-21 1103):
 - A. Construction, planning, and design of on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other nonmotorized forms of transportation, including sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic calming techniques, lighting and other safety-related infrastructure, and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.
 - B. Construction, planning, and design of infrastructure-related projects and systems that will provide safe routes for non-drivers, including children, older adults, and individuals with disabilities to access daily needs.
 - C. Conversion and use of abandoned railroad corridors for trails for pedestrians, bicyclists, or other nonmotorized transportation users.
 - D. Construction of turnouts, overlooks, and viewing areas.
 - E. Community improvement activities, including
 - i. inventory, control, or removal of outdoor advertising;
 - ii. historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities;
 - iii. vegetation management practices in transportation rights-of-way to improve roadway safety, prevent against invasive species, and provide erosion control; and
 - iv. archaeological activities relating to impacts from implementation of a transportation project eligible under title 23.
 - F. Any environmental mitigation activity, including pollution prevention and pollution abatement activities and mitigation to-
 - i. address stormwater management, control, and water pollution prevention or abatement related to highway construction or due to highway runoff, including activities described in sections 133(b)(11), 328(a), and 329 of title 23; or
 - ii. reduce vehicle-caused wildlife mortality or to restore and maintain connectivity among terrestrial or aquatic habitats.
- 2. The recreational trails program under section 206 of title 23.
- 3. The safe routes to school program under section 1404 of the SAFETEA-LU.
 - A. Infrastructure-related projects.-planning, design, and construction of infrastructure-related projects on any public road or any bicycle or pedestrian pathway or trail in the vicinity of schools that will substantially improve the ability of students to walk and bicycle to school, including sidewalk improvements, traffic calming and speed reduction improvements, pedestrian and bicycle crossing improvements, on-street bicycle facilities, off-street bicycle

and pedestrian facilities, secure bicycle parking facilities, and traffic diversion improvements in the vicinity of schools.

- B. Noninfrastructure-related activities to encourage walking and bicycling to school, including public awareness campaigns and outreach to press and community leaders, traffic education and enforcement in the vicinity of schools, student sessions on bicycle and pedestrian safety, health, and environment, and funding for training, volunteers, and managers of safe routes to school programs.
- C. Safe Routes to School coordinator.
- 4. <u>Planning, designing, or constructing boulevards and other roadways</u> largely in the right-of-way of former Interstate System routes or other divided highways.

INELIGIBLE ACTIVIES

Section 1103 of MAP-21 eliminated the definition of transportation enhancement activities in section 104 of title 23 and inserted in its place a definition of transportation alternatives, which does not include eligibility for certain activities that were previously eligible as transportation enhancements:

- A. Safety and educational activities for pedestrians and bicycles.
 - Exception: Activities targeting children in Kindergarten through 8th grade are eligible under SRTS (an eligible activity under the TAP funding).
 - Note: Some of these activities may be eligible under HSIP. Non construction projects for bicycle safety remain broadly eligible for STP funds.
- B. Acquisition of scenic easements and scenic or historic sites.
- C. Scenic or historic highway programs (including visitor and welcome centers).
 - i.Note: A few specific activities under this category (construction of turnouts, overlooks, and viewing areas) remain eligible under section 101(a)(29)(D) of title 23.
- D. Historic preservation as an independent activity unrelated to historic transportation facilities. Note: Historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities are permitted as one type of community improvement activity; see section 101(a)(29)(E).
- E. Operation of historic transportation facilities.
- F. Archaeological planning and research undertaken for proactive planning. This category now must be used only as mitigation for highway projects.
- G. Transportation museums.

ELIGIBLE PROJECT SPONSORS

Eligible project sponsors to receive TAP funds pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 213(c)(4)(B) are:

- local governments;
- regional transportation authorities;
- transit agencies;
- natural resource or public land agencies;
- school districts, local education agencies, or schools;
- tribal governments; and
- any other local or regional governmental entity with responsibility for oversight of transportation or recreational trails (other than a metropolitan planning organization or a State

agency) that the State determines to be eligible, consistent with the goals of subsection (c) of section 213 of title 23.

(NOTE: The CRTPA is not an eligible sponsor)

CRTPA TA FUNDING AVAILABILITY

Approximately \$310,000 of Transportation Alternatives funding is anticipated to be dedicated annually for the CRTPA region (Gadsden, Jefferson, Leon and Wakulla counties). This funding is from the 50% of TA funding that is to be distributed based upon population pursuant to MAP-21.

Additional TA funding not expressly dedicated to any area is also available to fund the CRTPA's TA projects. This funding is TA ("Any Area") funds and is received by the District 3. Projects not funded with The CRTPA will submit candidate projects for the allocation of Any Area TA funds and such projects will compete for funding with other TA eligible projects in District 3.

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

Staff is seeking approval of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2016 – FY 2020 Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Priority Project List, included as *Attachment 1*.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY CRTPA COMMITTEES

On September 2, 2014, the CRTPA's two (2) committees (Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee) recommended CRTPA <u>approval</u> of the FY 2016 - FY 2020 Strategic Intermodal System Priority Project List.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Adopt the FY 2016 – FY 2020 Strategic Intermodal System Priority Project List.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

In 2003, Florida's Legislature and Governor established Florida's Strategic Intermodal System, known as the SIS. The SIS is based on the 2020 Florida Transportation Plan (FTP), which calls for the development of a "strategic intermodal system" to enhance Florida's economic competitiveness. The FTP recommends that this system "provide for smooth and efficient transfers for both passengers and freight between seaports, airports, railroads, highways and other elements of the strategic intermodal system and reduce delay for people and goods movement through increased system efficiency and multimodal capacity."

CRTPA SIS FACILITIES

The following roadways are on the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) system in the CRTPA planning area:

- 1. Interstate 10 From Jackson County Line (in the east) to the Madison County Line (in the west),
- 2. Thomasville Road from Interstate 10 to the Georgia State line (Leon County),
- 3. Capital Circle, Northwest from Interstate 10 to the Tallahassee Regional Airport (Leon County),
- 4. Tennessee Street/Mahan Drive from the Greyhound Bus Terminal to Interstate 10 (East) (Leon County), and
- 5. US 19 from the Georgia State Line to the Madison County Line (Jefferson County).

TALLAHASSEE-LEON COUNTY SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL STUDY

REQUESTED BY: CRTPA Staff

Type of Item: Discussion/Action

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

The consultants conducting the Tallahassee-Leon County Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Study for the CRTPA have completed the required school inventory studies and recommendations. Comments have been received from Leon County Public Works and the City of Tallahassee Public Works.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY CRTPA SUBCOMMITTEES

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)

The TAC at their September 2, 2014 meeting recommended accepting the SRTS Study.

Citizens Multimodal Advisory Committee (CMAC)

The CMAC at their September 2, 2014 meeting recommended accepting the SRTS Study.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Option 1: Accept the SRTS Study dated August 2014.

HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

Safe Routes to School (SRTS) is a national and international movement to create safe, convenient, and fun opportunities for children to bicycle and walk to and from schools. The program has been designed to reverse the decline in children walking and bicycling to schools. Safe Routes to School can also play a critical role in reversing the nationwide trend toward childhood obesity and inactivity.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) has developed general SRTS Guidance which all states must follow to be eligible for SRTS transportation funding. However, this guidance allows states the flexibility to tailor their state SRTS programs in a way that works best for them so long as they comply with the principles and goals laid out in the federal Guidance.

SRTS inventories were conducted in Gadsden, Jefferson and Wakulla counties as part of their most recent Bicycle/Pedestrian plans. To complete the SRTS inventory for the region, one needed to be conducted for Leon County. The CRTPA approved the scope for the SRTS study on March 15, 2012. Following the approval of the scope, the CRTPA contracted with Renaissance Planning Group. Thirty

eight schools were visited and inventories of conditions were completed. Schools participated in a travel survey, and parents responded via written survey forms or on line. Three visits to the Leon County School Board District Advisory Committee were made to gather input and comment on the study. In all 38 studies were completed and distributed to each school for their review and input. The individual school reports can be found at www.crtpa.org. The Leon County School Board voted to accept the study at its meeting of April 22, 2014.

The completed Tallahassee-Leon County SRTS study was originally scheduled to be presented to the CRTPA Board at the May 19, 2014 meeting. At the May 6, 2014 meeting of the CRTPA Technical Advisory Committee, it was recommended the presentation of SRTS study to the Board postponed to the June Board meeting to allow additional time for the City and County Public Works Departments to comment on the study. Leon County provided comments provided comments on May 28th. However, City comments have not been received. At the June 3, 2014 meeting of the CRTPA Technical Advisory Committee, it was again recommended the presentation of SRTS study to the Board postponed, this time to the September Board meeting to allow additional time for the City Public Works Department to comment on the study. Comments have been received by both the County and City Public Works Departments. Responses have been provided to both Departments and modifications have been made to the SRTS Study report. The comments were mostly related to concerns regarding recommendations that may have potential conflicts with exist County and City policies related to sidewalks and traffic calming. These issues were addressed in the documents. In addition, some of the project recommendations were modified based on the comments received.

A status report on the activities of the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) with regard to the Teen Driver Education and Outreach Program will be provided and covers the following:

- The CRTPA was awarded highway safety funds in the amount of \$61,601 on May 13, 2014 to fund the implementation of a Teen Driver Education and Outreach Program in Leon County. Although only recently awarded, this program was originally approved by the CRTPA Board as a CRTPA work task at the November 26, 2012 CRTPA Board Meeting and submitted for original consideration by the FDOT in March of 2012. Federal funding freezes outside the control of the CRTPA or FDOT resulted in the delay of the award.
- The Teen Driver Education and Outreach Program was submitted for funding by CRTPA staff in coordination with the Tallahassee Police Department (TPD) and the Leon County Community Traffic Safety Team (CTST) to address safety concerns in Leon County with regard to teen drivers and other driving factors. The Table below illustrates these concerns.

Note: Categories of crashes shown highlighted in yellow have become progressively worse over the three year reporting period, with the exception of Teen and Speed related crashes, which remain in the number one spot for at least 2 consecutive reporting periods.

- Thus far, \$47, 230.63 of the grant has been expended to purchase some of the necessary materials and training for the program. The program has not yet been initiated into the schools due to issues with payment procedures for instructors of the course, and insurance agreements which need to be formulated and executed.
- The grant expires on October 1, 2014, however, the CRTPA has been awarded a continuation grant for the program in the amount of \$32,209, which primarily covers paid instructors for the course. The continuation funding is eligible from October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015, pending acceptance of the subgrant application by FDOT. The subgrant application to accept the funds is being written concurrent with the legal agreements necessary to commence the program with other various local government agencies including the Tallahassee Police Department, Leon County Schools, Leon County Sherriff's Office, and Florida Highway Patrol.
- The CRTPA attorney is working with these entities to resolve legal paperwork needed to implement the instruction part of the program.
- The Highway Safety Matrix-Ranking of Florida Counties (based on fatal and injury crashes during 2008-2012) is provided on the following page, which shows Leon County ranking in the top 5 of 23 Florida Counties for various safety concern indicators.

The following is in response to your May 29, 2014 letter and transmittal of the Final Fiscal Year (FY) 2014/15-2015/16 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) that was developed and adopted by the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) for our review.

Upon our review of the Final UPWP, we have determined that the document satisfies the requirements of 23 U.S.C. 134, 49 U.S.C. 5303, 23 CFR Part 420, 49 CFR Part 18 and other pertinent legislation, regulations and policies. Moreover, we have determined that our comments on the Draft UPWP have been adequately addressed.

As delegated in the January 2011 Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Florida Division and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), Region IV for Administration of Transportation Planning and Programming, the FHWA approves the MPO's FY 2014/15-2015/16 UPWP submitted by your office.

The FY 2014/15-2015/16 UPWP reflects \$567,000 of Planning (PL) funds for FY 2014/15 and \$565,000 of PL funds for 2015/16. The funds for FY 2014/15 are available upon an approved authorization. Expenditure invoicing and progress reports should be submitted quarterly, with copies to the FHWA. Expenditures incurred without prior authorization will not be reimbursed. The funds for FY 2015/16 will not be available for use until July 1, 2015. Close-out of the PL funds shall occur 90 days after the end of FY 2015/16 state fiscal year (by September 30, 2016). Any exception to this time frame must be prior approved by the FHWA.

Subject: Potential TSM projects

The purpose of this email is to request that the Florida Department of Transportation evaluate three (3) locations within the urban area of Tallahassee as potential candidate projects for inclusion on the CRTPA's Transportation Systems Management (TSM) candidate project list. Specifically, the CRTPA would like the following locations, all within areas of increasing pedestrian activity, evaluated:

Apalachee Parkway (SR 20) and Magnolia Drive (SR 265)

This intersection provides challenges to pedestrians given the high volume of vehicular traffic, large number of lanes to cross and associated crosswalk distances (including the absence of a marked crosswalk on the east side of intersection). Additionally, the recent completion of Apalachee Parkway sidewalks east of this location (as well as the planned construction of sidewalks beginning approximately .7 miles to the west associated with scheduled resurfacing of the Parkway in 2016) has facilitated improved pedestrian mobility in this regional commercial corridor.

Monroe Street (SR 63) and Thomasville Road (SR 61)

This intersection is located in the midtown area of Tallahassee and has no marked crosswalks. Additionally, a continuous northbound right turn lane on Monroe Street to Thomasville Road makes the intersection challenging for pedestrians (pedestrians continuing north/south on the east side of Monroe have to cross this lane). The area has seen growing pedestrian activity due the presence of commercial establishments and nearby residential neighborhoods. Additionally, immediately west of this intersection is The Grove. The Grove (http://www.flheritage.com/grove/), an antebellum home on ten acres once owned by Governor Collins, is scheduled to open in the fall of 2014 and is anticipated to increase pedestrian activity in the vicinity.

Thomasville Road (SR 61) and 5th Avenue vicinity (south to 3rd Avenue and north to 7th Avenue)

Similar to the above intersection, this location (actually a segment of Thomasville Road) is in the midtown area of Tallahassee. This segment of Thomasville Road appears to contain the most pedestrian activity due to the proximity of commercial uses in the immediate area which include restaurants and bars. Pedestrian activity tends to be most heavy in the evenings increasingly so later on in the week. The posted speed limit of this portion of Thomasville Road is 25 mph; however, it appears that speeding and failure to yield to pedestrians are an issue along the corridor. Additionally, sidewalks are somewhat narrow given the observed pedestrian volumes and there are areas of continuous curb cuts creating potential pedestrian and vehicular conflicts. A rectangular rapid flashing beacon was added at 5th Avenue to assist pedestrians cross at this location in 2012.

The CRTPA is supportive of a preliminary analysis that can address opportunities for increased pedestrian and vehicular safety at these locations.

STATEMENT OF ISSUE

CRTPA SUBCOMMITTEE ACTIONS

TAC and CMAC: The TAC and the CMAC met on Tuesday, September 2, 2014, and took action on the following items:

- <u>Minutes of the June 3, 2014 Committee Meetings</u> Both committees approved their respective minutes.
- <u>Fiscal Year (FY) 2015 FY 2019 Priority Project List Adoption</u> -- Both committees recommended approval of all of the Priority Project Lists.
- <u>Leon County Safe Routes To School (SRTS) Study</u> Both committees recommended approval of the Leon County SRTS Study.

In addition, the TAC and CMAC heard presentations on and discussed the following:

- Year 2040 Regional Mobility Plan Update
- Roudabouts for Intersection Safety/Operational Improvement

TDCB: The actions of the Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Boards in Gadsden, Jefferson, Leon and Wakulla Counties are listed below.

The Leon County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board

The TDCB met on July 23, 2014. At this meeting, the Bylaws and Grievance Process Annual Review and Update was approved by the members, The Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan was presented for annual review to the members and ratified, and Board Member William Benjamin reported on his attendance at the National Association for the Blind and conference activities. In addition, a discussion regarding the impacts of Medicare Managed Care and its transportation component was led by the Community Transportation Coordinator and the operators present. It was reported that since Star Metro no longer provides Medicaid transportation the financial impact on other providers was less than anticipated. Star Metro also gave a presentation on Flex Routes during which they discussed the positive impacts of the Lake Jackson Flex and its rapidly growing ridership.

The Wakulla County Local Coordinating Board

The Wakulla County Local Coordinating Board has not met since the CRTPA last met. Their next meeting will be on September 16, 2014.

Gadsden and Jefferson Counties Local Coordinating Boards

The next scheduled meeting of these two Boards is September 11, 2014. At the time of this agenda preparation, these two Boards have not met. However, scheduled for presentation for both boards is their Annual Operating Report, the Community Transportation Coordinators Report, and other related issues. Details of the meetings will be presented at the next CRTPA meeting.
